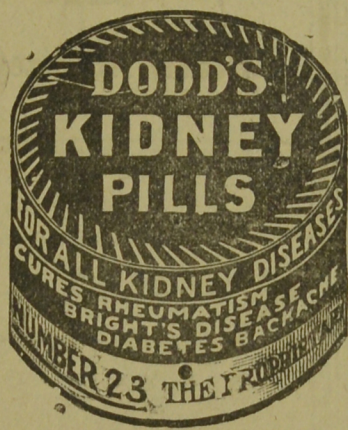

**MEETING**  
**IN TORONTO**Toronto, June 12.—A rousing pro-  
scription meeting was held last  
night in Massey Hall, the second with-  
in forty-eight hours. Liberals and  
Conservatives alike passed a resolu-  
tion for the "conscription of the man  
power, the material power and the  
moral power" of the country.Mr. N. W. Rowell, the Liberal lead-  
er in Ontario, was particularly cheer-  
ed when he declared that "the pre-  
sence of Sir William Hearst and my-  
self on this platform this evening indi-  
cates that as far as we are concerned  
this is not a party issue."  
Earnestly Mr. Rowell pleaded for  
"the better organization of the re-  
sources and man-power of Canada for  
a more vigorous and effective prose-

possible to procure an increased re-  
venue without adding to rate of stump-  
age. He (Magee) was in favor of an  
increased stumpage, but he believed  
it should be made on a modified scale  
so as not to bear too hard on the lum-  
bering interests of the North Shore,  
where millions of dollars are invested.  
He had no desire whatever to inter-  
fere with vested rights in that impor-  
tant section of the province. The late  
government had placed a valuation of  
\$35,000,000 on the Crown Lands, and  
they had been valued by a forestry  
expert at \$49,000,000. From these  
lands we now receive a revenue of  
\$540,000 a year, which is equal to  
about 1 per cent. plus the cost of col-  
lection.He wished it understood that his  
views in regard to the Crown Lands  
were his own views and he was not  
speaking for the hon. gentlemen who  
occupied the treasury benches. He  
believed that the time had arrived  
when they should either get more  
revenue from the Crown Lands or  
offer them for sale. If they could be  
disposed of for something like \$49,-  
000,000 some scheme might be work-  
ed out by which the public debt could  
be discharged, and from the balance,  
if placed on interest, there would be  
a substantial revenue to assist in car-  
rying on the business of the country.It did not seem to him like good  
business to be deriving one per cent.  
from the Crown Lands and borrowing  
money for the public services at the  
rate of 5 per cent. His hon. friend  
from Northumberland and other lum-  
bermen might not agree with his sug-  
gestion, but he thought it could be  
worked out. If it was not possible to  
work out a plan such as he had outlin-  
ed, the sum of \$120,000 might be ad-  
ded to the revenue by an increase of  
50 cents per thousand in the stump-  
age rate. In the province of Nova  
Scotia he was informed that a reve-  
nue of \$125,000 was derived from a  
tax on theatre tickets. He believed  
that such a tax if imposed in this pro-  
vince would increase the revenue by  
at least \$62,500. In British Columbia  
and Nova Scotia wilderness lots over  
500 acres were taxed. This plan per-  
haps could be adopted in New Brun-  
swick and would mean an increase of  
at least \$50,000 in the revenue.**Public Utilities.**Coming next to public utilities, he  
thought that they should be paying  
more money into the revenue of the  
province. The cost of telephones is  
higher than it was but there had been  
no increase in taxation. An increas-  
ed tax on telephone companies should  
add another \$5,000 to the revenue.He believed they could also make a  
50 per cent. increase in royalties on  
coal and iron and from this source  
\$7,000 additional could be obtained.

Charles Marsh, a child. — Plymouth,  
N. H. Record.to contribute an additional \$7,000 to  
the province. If these suggestions  
were followed out, the revenue of the  
province would be augmented by  
\$251,500. As matters stand now, there  
was a revenue of \$1,500,000, and an ex-  
penditure staring them in the face of  
\$1,900,000. They had the Valley Rail-  
way on their hands and would have to  
take care of the interest. The time  
had arrived when hon. members on  
both sides would have to put their  
heads together and work for an in-  
crease in the revenue of the province.  
The loss of some \$24,000 from liquor  
licenses was staring them in the face  
and to his mind it was a commend-  
able loss. In addition they would  
have to provide the sum of \$6,000 for  
administering the Prohibition Act.There was a good deal of truth in  
what the ex-Attorney General had  
said, that the railway policy of the  
province had been solicited by poli-  
ticians on both sides of the House. In  
this connection, however, he had been  
pleased to hear the Hon. Attorney  
General and the hon. member for Nor-  
thumberland say that they had taken  
no stock in the late government's rail-  
way propaganda but had voted against  
it. To his mind the railway policy of  
New Brunswick had been economic-  
ally wrong and unsound. He regret-  
ted that the Transcontinental Railway  
had not been routed down the St. John  
valley, but he felt that the antagonis-  
tic feeling between St. John and Hal-  
ifax had been largely responsible for  
the selection of the central route. He  
would have something to say on the  
railway question when the ex-Attorney  
General's motion for Maritime union  
came before the House.He thought they had altogether too  
many railways for the population, but
