HON. MR. BALFOUR IS NOT CAMERA SHY

British Foreign Secretary Most Accommodating "Subject." Washington Times—Far from being "camera shy," Mr. Balfour is fearless of the motion picture and "still life" machines.

The British statesman may not desire to have his photograph in the newspapers and magazines, and on theatre screens, but he is perfectly willing to oblige the camera men. Not once since his arrival in Washington has he declined to pose when requested.

Arriving at the French embassy for lunch yesterday, accompanied by Ambassador Spring-Rice, Lady Spring-Rice, and Lady Maude Cavendish, daughter of the Duke of Devonshire, he confronted seven moving picture newspaper photographers. Waiting until the others had entered the embassy, Mr. Balfour stood on the steps, hat in hand, while the movie machines clicked.

One little man, with a camera almost as large as himself, was crowded out and could not get a picture.

"Won't you step out here a little further, so I can get a picture?" he asked. "I have hardly a second; I'm late now," replied the British foreign secretary, as he complied.
