Official Report From General Haig Issued By the War Office---Heavy Artillery Fighting on the Belgian Front---Advance Posts Bombarded.

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SPANISH PRESS DISCUSSES THE INTERNMENT OF A HUN SUBMARINE

MADRID, Aug. 6.—The Epoca, a government organ, protests against the comments of the Progerman press regarding the internment of the German submarine U-23, which arrived at Corunna seriously damaged, and was taken to Ferroll.
