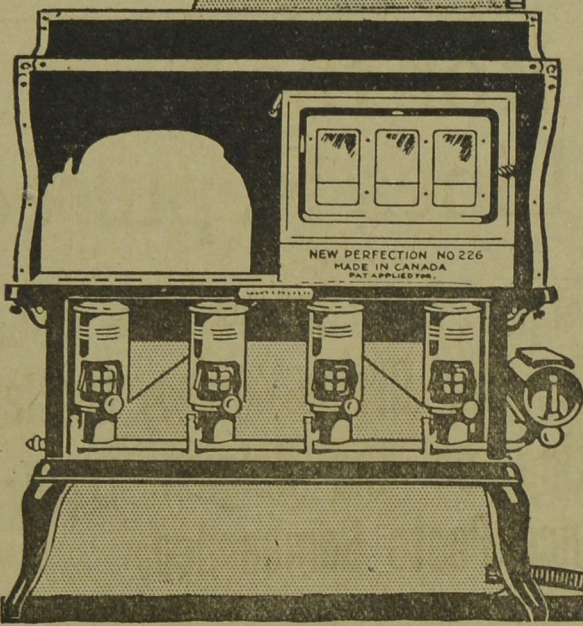

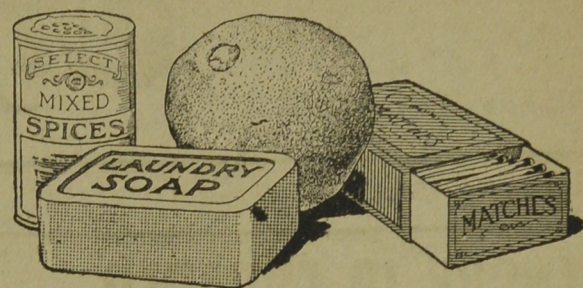
THE SITUATION IN RUSSIA IS VERY SERIOUS

London, Aug. 4.—Events in Russia have reached a most serious turn. Premier Kerensky and all members of his cabinet with one exception resigned yesterday, as a result of sensational charges against one member and later only agreed to remain provisionally in the country's interest.

General Erdelli, the new military governor of Petrograd, was assassinated—shot treacherously in the back. At the front, Czernowitz, capital of the Austrian crown land of Bukowina, passed again into Teutonic possession. A peace understanding between Austria and Russia is reported.

Negotiations Broken Off.

London, Aug. 4.—The negotiations between the Russian cabinet of Premier Kerensky and the Constitutional Democrats with a view to the latter joining a coalition government, says a Reuter despatch from Petrograd dated Thursday, have been broken off. A despatch to the same news agency dated Friday in Petrograd, says that Mavksentief, chairman of the executive committee of the council of peasants' delegates, has been appointed minister of the interior.

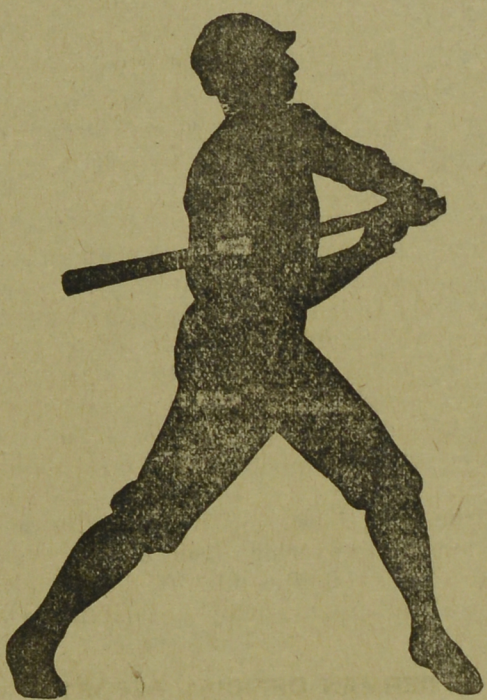

The Onward Sweep of Prohibition!



When the staggering cataclysm of the world-upheaval broke over Europe in 1914, the Entente Nations faced not one, but two powerful foes—Germany and drink!

By one gigantic stroke Russia shook herself free from the toils of the monstrous vodka demon. Many other nations followed her wonderful example in varying degrees. From the great upheaval must come compensations. One of the greatest for Canada is her great heritage—Prohibition.

THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT

The policy of the Dominion Alliance is to encourage the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act (Scott Act) in counties in which it has been operating. Where this is done the new Provincial Prohibitory Law would then become effective.

It is always easier to enforce one uniform law. The New Brunswick Government cannot put its new law in effect in Scott Act counties, as the latter is Dominion legislation, which has precedence over provincial legislation. Friends of temperance who live in Scott Act counties are, however, asked to co-operate in the more thorough enforcement of that Act so long as it continues in operation.

Do you realize that every province in Canada, except British Columbia and Quebec, are now actually enjoying Prohibition! And Prohibition is winning too in Quebec; 976 municipalities in Quebec are "dry" and only 182 "wet"! What a glorious heritage! But the day is not far off when the great test must come. Shall Prohibition laws remain permanently on the law books—or only for "duration of the war"?

The answer depends upon the use we make of the weapon of prohibitory law while it is in our grasp. Upon the shoulders of every man and woman in this province (who wants to see the curse abolished forever) lies a heavy burden of responsibility! Prohibition *must be enforced* and the trenches held, not by a few zealous officers of the law alone—but *by the whole people!*

Help to Enforce Prohibition

Since September 16, 1916, Ontario has enjoyed good enforcement of Prohibition in all but a few districts. Not the most daring anti-prohibitionist harbors the slightest hope for a return to the curse of the traffic in Ontario. Here are some figures showing results in Ontario's largest cities for the last three months of 1915 and 1916:

Note—"It will be noted that Ottawa has not much reduction in arrests for drunkenness, and that it has an actual increase in all offences. RAILWAY STRIKE IS DEFERRED

San Francisco, Aug. 4.—A strike of 8,500 employees of the Southern Pacific Railway, which was called for tonight, has been deferred pending action by federal mediators, it was announced by representatives of the four railroad brotherhoods involved.

Subsequent developments will depend upon the success of the mediators, who are expected to arrive here and begin their investigations immediately.

The differences over which the employees have threatened to strike rose over the decisions by the company on various grievance cases of workmen.

In Providence.

Mr. Charles H. Edgecombe and the members of his auto party were in Providence at last accounts and were heading for the White Mountains. Mr. Edgecombe writes that while motoring down Broadway, New York recently, he counted nine dead horses which had been overcome by the heat.

CHANCELLOR RETURNS HOME

Copenhagen, Aug. 4.—The Berlin correspondent of the Politiken says Chancellor Michaelis has returned to Vienna, conferred with several members of the cabinet, and will have a talk with the Emperor tomorrow.

Returned from England.

Major R. L. Fitton of Mauderville who has been overseas with the C.E.F. arrived here last night. He left in August, 1914, with the First Contingent as battalion quarter master sergeant. He was promoted to his present rank since that time.
