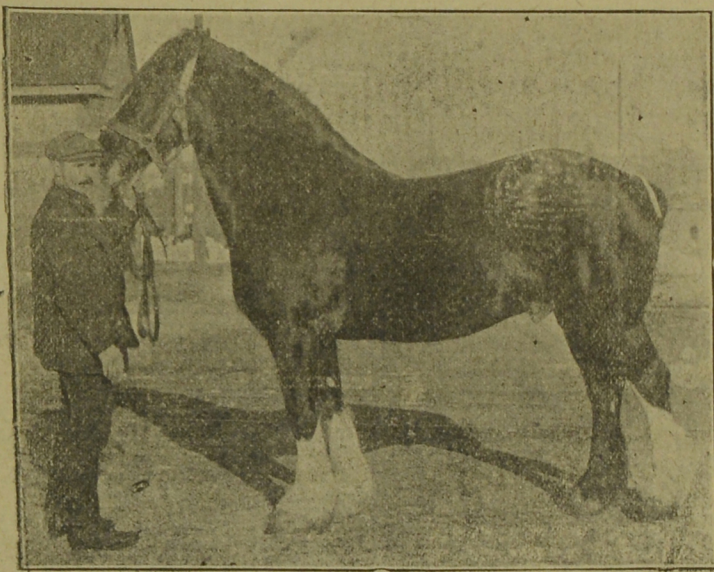

MONCTON CLASSES ALL FILLED, OMEN FOR LOCAL MEET

Horses Now in Aroostook Co. May Enter for Fredericton Races—Promoters are Pleased.

Mr. T. V. Monahan, secretary of the New Brunswick Harness Short Ship Circuit on Saturday night received the pleasing information by long distance 'phone from Moncton that all four classes for the Moncton race meet had filled and that prospects for two goods days' racing were excellent.

Moncton starts the ball rolling August 10th, next Friday. With a good beginning there followers of the racing game in New Brunswick will see a circuit which will do much to revive interest in horse racing. St. John will have two days' racing next week on the 17th and 18th, Friday and Saturday. On Wednesday and Thursday of the following week Fredericton will have its two days' sport and Chatham will come after that.

With the Moncton classes all filling Fredericton also should fill for there is only one class which differs. The local horsemen are much pleased with the prospect.

There is said to be an excellent prospect of some of the horses which have found the company on the Aroostook Circuit a little too fast, coming to the New Brunswick Circuit. If they come Fredericton will get them.

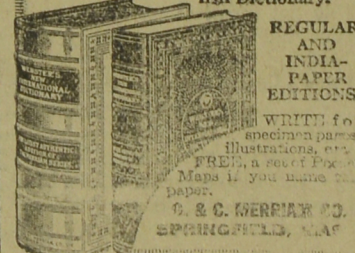

PRES. WILSON IS STRONG FOR WORLD'S SERIES

Ban Johnson's Opinion Does Not Get Many Backers—Big Promoters Have Hopes.

Chicago, Aug. 3. — As a result of recent statements by President Ban Johnson of the American League, intimating there would be no World Series, W. S. Forman, sporting editor of the Herald, wrote a letter to President Wilson asking him flatly for his opinion as to whether baseball should continue. Today he received an answer announcing that the President was not only strongly in favor of the National game going on, but opposes any curtailment. He makes it plain that he does not consider it unpatriotic.

Pres. Weeghman of the Cubs came out tonight in a strong indorsement of President Wilson's attitude, while owner Comiskey of the White Sox says: "I am glad President Wilson's views on this matter are clear and broad-minded. As for Pres. Johnson I cannot understand his attitude. If you will remember he had us closing our gates in June. A short time later he had us staggering under the strain. Still more recently he came out with the statement about calling off the World's Series."

"As a matter of fact Johnson has nothing to do with the World's Series. If my team wins the pennant we'll play a world's Series whether Johnson wants one or not. It was strictly up to President Wilson to stop us—not Johnson—if there was any reason to do so."

"Baseball is a large and expensive institution. It hurts the game to have an advance man swinging around the circuit howling calamity."

MAGEE LET GO TO CINCINNATI

Boston, Aug. 3. — Sherwood Magee of the Braves has been released to Cincinnati at the waiver price. Business Manager Hagood said last night that Magee would report to Cincinnati today. Magee came to the Boston club in 1915 in exchange for George Whitted, Oscar Dugey and a money consideration, and was something of a disappointment, as he fell off both in hitting and fielding. Stallings has always contended that this was President Gaffney's trade; that he would not have been in favor of letting Whitted go.
