everything is nice for them, will you?"

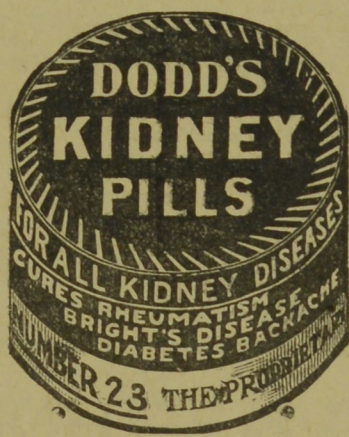
He smiled at her, and buried him-
