

The Attorney General Introduces Bill In the Legislature- - To Cut Out Liquor Advertising---Fund for Permanent Highways to be Provided From Auto Licence Fees---Succession Duty's Fees to go Into The Revenue in Future.

The Legislature resumed at 8.30 o'clock last evening after a ten day's adjournment. There was a fair attendance of members and considerable

Abolition of the commission upon the collection of succession duties, authority to appoint a deputy Attorney General, the funding of the automobile licenses to enable the province to begin the construction of permanent roads and important and necessary amendments to the Prohibition Act, were some of the important government measures introduced during the evening.

For years the fees from succession duties, amounting to thousands of dollars annually, have gone into the pockets of the Attorney General instead of into the revenues of the province. The present government proposes to do away with this, and at the same time seeks authority to appoint a deputy
