MORE TAXES TO BE LEVIED ON BUSINESS PROFITS

Finance Minister White's Budget Speech Was the Shortest on Record---Fifty Per Cent of all Profits in Excess of Fifteen Per Cent to be Taken by the Government---Criticism From Liberals.

Ottawa, April 24.—Tariff changes—though none is announced—and a substantial increase in the taxation of war profits were the outstanding features of Sir Thomas White's half-hour budget speech in the Commons today. It was the shortest budget speech given in the Commons in many years, and most of it was summed up in one short paragraph defining the increased taxation on business profits in excess of fifteen per cent. of the capital invested. "We propose," said Sir Thomas, "to take from persons, firms and companies liable to the business profits war tax, 1916, 50 per cent. of all profits in excess of 15 per cent., but not exceeding 20 per cent. per annum, and 25 per cent. of profits in excess of 20 per cent. per annum upon capital."

The war profiteers who up to the present have been obliged to contribute only 25 per cent. of their profits in excess of a 7 per cent. dividend on capital investment, will this year have to pay into the Dominion treasury to help finance the war, half of all the profits they make over 15 per cent. on capital investment and three-quarters of all profits over 20 per cent.

There are hundreds of firms which have been making as high as 100 per cent. per annum profit on war orders during the past two years.

This movement is no wakening belated action to collect something like a fair share for the national treasury out of the money which a small body of fortunate friends of the government have been able to make out of the war.

General Figures Only

Sir Thomas was very brief in his presentation of the financial and trade results of the past fiscal year. He dealt only in general figures, and did not attempt to analyze the details of income or expenditure or trade developments. He noted, amid government applause, that out of a total income

of \$232,000,000 last year an increase of \$62,000,000 over the preceding year, the government was able to meet all ordinary and capital domestic expenditure and still have \$60,000,000 to the good to apply on the principal of the war debt. He recognized the growing financial obligation of the country arising out of war claims, but for the present at least he thought that the proposed increase in the business tax was all that was necessary. He deprecated the imposition of an income tax as being both unwise and impracticable in Canada.

Opposition Criticism.

A. K. McLean, of Halifax, in leading the criticism of the budget from the opposition side, declared that the government was still falling far short of its obligations to pare down domestic expenditures and take fuller advantage of the present prosperity to finance a large proportion of the war expenditure out of present taxation. He and Dr. Michael Clark, who followed him, emphasized particularly the failure of the government to give any tariff relief for the increased cost of living, and drew the moral from the belated repentance in regard to free wheat.

War profits, they declared, should have been adequately taken in their first two years of rich profiteering. They enunciated again the Liberal policy of free foodstuffs and free entry for the instruments of production.

J. G. Turriff, at the night sitting, reviewed the consistent record of Liberalism with regard to free wheat as contrasted with the inconsistency of the government, and asked the Conservative side of the House to finally make public acknowledgment of delayed and permanent conversion by formally ratifying by act of parliament the act of cabinet council in removing by order-in-council the duty on wheat, flour and other wheat products.

C. P. R. Man Back From Russia

St. John, April 25.—George Bury, vice-president of the C. P. R., reached St. John today from Russia, which country he visited at the request of the British and Russian governments in connection with transportation.

Jumped From a Moving Train

Lake Megantic, April 25.—O. Beaudry was instantly killed when he leaped from a moving train at a railway crossing today. The coroner's jury, returning a verdict of accidental death, added a rider that the railways commission should compel railways to have gates on cars to avoid such accidents.

Calgary Preacher Named For Moderator

Edmonton, Alta., April 25.—The Presbyterian Synod has chosen Rev. Wm. Shearer of Calgary, Alberta, as its nominee for moderator of the General Assembly.

CAPT. ROYDEN BARBOUR IS WOUNDED IN CHEST

Further particulars concerning the wounds of Capt. Royden Barbour, of this city, were received today. He is in hospital with severe wounds in the chest and back.

Corporal James Edward Kearmen, of St. Marys, is in hospital at Willeureux, France, with contusions of the back, according to the word received by his wife. Corporal Kearmen is a native of England but enlisted here in the 104th Battalion last winter. After arriving in England he was transferred to a battalion in France.

Private John Wilfrid Collins, son of Mr. James Collins, formerly section foreman on the Fredericton and Grand Lake Railway at Barker's Point, is reported with gunshot wounds in the face. His relatives reside at Avery's Portage.

H. M. McCloskey, of Boiestown, and J. H. Hawkins, of Fredericton, are reported in the casualty list as wounded.

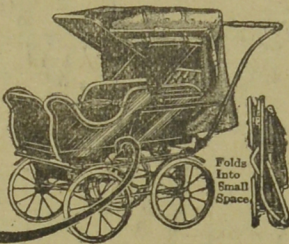
