

CITY CLERK MCCREADY DEAD AFTER A LENGTHY ILLNESS

Well Known Lawyer and Public Official Passes Away--Was One of the Organizers of the Fredericton Board of Trade and Had Performed Valuable Work for the City--A Director of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company.

After an illness extending over a period of nearly three years, from ulcers of the stomach, Mr. J. W. McCready, City Clerk of Fredericton, passed away on Sunday morning. It was generally known that his illness had recently taken a serious turn, and that he had no chance for recovery, yet the news of his death was heard with great regret by all classes of citizens. The late Mr. McCready was taken ill in March, 1914, and went to Montreal, where he was under treatment by a specialist. His ailment yielded to the treatment and he returned home at the end of a few weeks with his health considerably improved. Shortly afterwards, however, he had a severe attack of hemorrhage and for days his life was despaired of. He had the advantage of a strong constitution and rallied sufficiently to enable him to attend to his office work, but his health was never completely restored. He suffered a relapse about a month ago and since that time has been steadily losing strength, although he maintained a cheerful demeanor and was always hopeful that his health would be restored. The long and brave struggle against ill health ended at 10.30 on Sunday morning with death the visitor.

Sketch of His Career.

The late Mr. J. W. McCready was of Scotch-Irish descent, and was a native of Wickham, Queens county, where he was born on February 11th, 1855, being therefore in his 62nd year. He was educated at the village school and afterwards completed a course at the Provincial Normal School. He taught school for several years, and then entered the University of New Brunswick from which he graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1880. Soon afterwards he was articled as a student in the law office of Fraser, Wetmore & Winslow, and took up newspaper work as a side line on the staff of the old Fredericton Capital.

Upon being admitted an attorney he opened an office in this city and has even since made his home here. He succeeded Mr. John Black as county auditor in 1890 and filled the office in a satisfactory manner for thirteen years. In 1894 he was appointed revising barrister for York under the Dominion Franchise Act, and held the office until the act was repealed by the Laurier government in 1896.

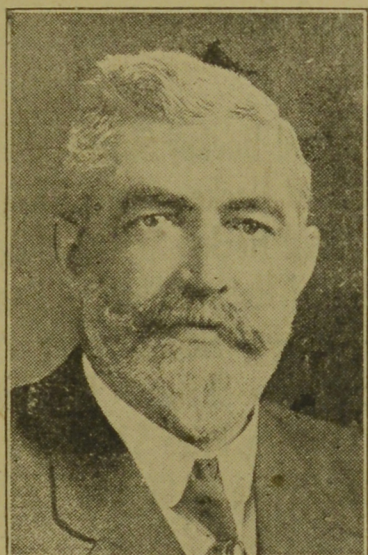
Mr. McCready was solicitor for the People's Bank of N. B. for several years before it was absorbed by the Bank of Montreal. He was appointed city clerk

in 1904 in succession to Mr. C. W. Beckwith, holding the office up to the time of his death. He also acted as manager of the City Opera House.

Active in Board of Trade.

Mr. McCready was one of the charter members of the Fredericton Board of Trade, and served as secretary to that body for over twenty years. He also served for many years as a member of the Fredericton Tourist Association and at one time held the office of president.

Mr. McCready gave close attention to municipal problems, and was one of the organizers of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities, of which body he was honorary secretary-treasurer. He was a delegate to the meeting of the Canadian Union of Municipalities at Vancouver, B. C., a few years ago and was honored by being elected president of that body.

Mr. McCready was one of the organizers of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company, Ltd., in 1899, and has been secretary of that concern since its inception. He was also a member of the board of directors.

In his early days as a practising barrister, Mr. McCready interested himself in civic politics and for a time represented St. Ann's ward in the City Council. For many years prior to his appointment as city clerk, he was the Fredericton correspondent of the St. John Daily Sun. He was at one time an active worker in the ranks of the Conservative party, but of late he took an independent view of political questions. He was very frank in giving expression to his opinions on public questions and the political graffer found little favor with him.

Mr. McCready had a great fondness for outdoor sports and recreation. He brought the first sponson motor canoe to the city and handled it with the
