## The Dorchester By-Election

St. Henedine, Dorchester Co., Que-  
bec, Jan. 22.—A great snowstorm dur-  
ing the night filled up country roads  
and threatened to put a damper on the  
election campaign by making it im-  
possible for the candidates to keep  
their meeting appointments.

This morning, however, the meeting  
scheduled for St. Margaret, four miles  
from here, was held. Mr. Sevigny spent  
the night at St. Margaret, having driv-  
en in last night from Frampton, and  
Mr. Cannon slept at St. Henedine.

Hon. P. E. Blondin, who spoke at St.  
Anselme last night in the interests of  
Mr. Sevigny, left for the city. His op-  
ponent at the St. Anselme meeting  
was Ernest Lapointe, M. P. for Kam-  
ouraska.

## AN ALLIED SUCCESS IN MESOPOTAMIA

London, Jan. 21.—The War Office  
communication issued tonight concern-  
ing the operations in Mesopotamia  
says:

"The enemy has been expelled from  
a small strip on the right bank of the  
Tigris, in the bend of the river north-  
east of Kut-el-Amara. The whole  
trench system on a front of 2,500 yards  
to a depth of 1,000 yards, is now in our  
possession, and the right bank of the  
river from Kut-el-Amara down stream  
has been cleared of the enemy. Fur-  
ther progress has been made against  
the enemy's trenches on the right bank  
southwest of Kut-el-Amara."

### Raids in Candian Area.

London, Jan. 21.—The report from  
British headquarters in France, issued  
tonight says:

"A successful daylight raid was made  
this morning against enemy trenches  
southeast of Loos. Dugouts full of Ger-  
mans were bombed and destroyed.  
"Many casualties were inflicted on  
the enemy with small cost to ourselves.  
We secured some prisoners."

## CANADA CONSULTED ON PEACE TERMS?

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Files Question re  
Constantinople and Russia.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—World politics will  
shortly be a subject of discussion in  
the Canadian House of Commons on  
the initiative of the Hon. William Pugs-  
ley, who has placed on the order paper  
a question as to whether the govern-  
ment has been informed that Russia,  
with the consent of the Allies, is to be  
given Constantinople and the Dardan-  
elles as one of the terms of peace.

Mr. Pugsley desires to know whether  
the Canadian government was  
consulted regarding such an agreement  
and whether it is to be consulted re-  
garding peace terms.

The member for St. John also has a  
resolution on the same lines as that  
which he moved last year, for extend-  
ing the Dominion franchise to women  
who are qualified to vote in provincial  
elections.

## Habeas Corpus Again Used in C. T. A. Case

Grounds are That Two Sentences  
Ran Concur-  
rently.

Argument was heard before Judge  
Wilson on Friday last in habeas cor-  
pus proceedings in the case of Ernest  
Howes of Long's Hotel, now serving a  
term for violation of the Canada Tem-  
perance Act. Mr. P. J. Hughes sup-  
ported the application and Mr. R. B.  
Hanson opposed it.

The grounds on which the applica-  
tion was made are that the sentence  
has been served already and that it run  
concurrently with a sentence served  
previously. In this case Chief Finley  
had two commitments at the one time,  
but used them separately.
