LOCAL FAMILY RECEIVED WORD OF CASUALTY IN PERSIA

Lance Corp. Stanislaus Coveney Admitted to Hospital at Basra-- Serving With Oxford and Bucks L. I.

Mrs. John Coveney, of 121 St. John street, this morning received a cablegram from the Imperial Pay Office, London, informing her that her son, Lance Corp. Stanislaus Coveney, of the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry, had been admitted to hospital at Basra, Persia, with pneumonia. Lance Corp. Coveney joined the Imperial Army at the tender age of thirteen years, and has served upwards of eight years in India. His battalion was in the first British Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia, and he had the good fortune to leave Major General Townshend's force a short time before it became surrounded at Kut-el-Amara.

Farrier Sergt. Cecil Coveney, who is in France with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, is a brother. He left Fredericton as a gunner in the 2nd Field Battery. Another brother, Wilfrid, who is now at his home here, served with the Royal Flying Corps. A brother-in-law, Sergt. Jack Myshrahl, was with the 55th Battalion. Mr. John Coveney, father of the three soldiers, is an ex-sergeant major of the Royal Horse Artillery.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL LIKELY TO MEET ON TUESDAY, FEB. 13TH

Audit of County Accounts Necessarily Slow Proceeding---New Secretary Treasurer to be Appointed at Next Meeting

It is stated on good authority that Warden Neill will summon a meeting of the Municipal Council of York to open on Tuesday, February 13th.

Mr. Thomas V. Williams, who was appointed special auditor at the regular meeting of the Municipal Council this month, is making progress with his audit of the county accounts. The work is slow, however, because of the fact that the tax-collectors and other officials are bringing in their receipts from various parts of the county to aid the audit.

It is probable that a successor to the late F. St. John Bliss will be appointed at the next meeting. Mrs. W. J. Glenn is now acting secretary-treasurer. The name of Mr. Charles D. Richards is mentioned in connection with the appointment.

Storm Delays Trains.

A heavy snowstorm set in early this morning, accompanied by low temperature. The storm has been very severe at Quebec. The Montreal train is reported five hours late. The Boston train was an hour late and the New-castle express half an hour late. The Centreville train also was delayed. The storm followed a period of extremely cold weather. The temperature reported at the Pumping Station Saturday night was 22 degrees below zero, the coldest of the winter.

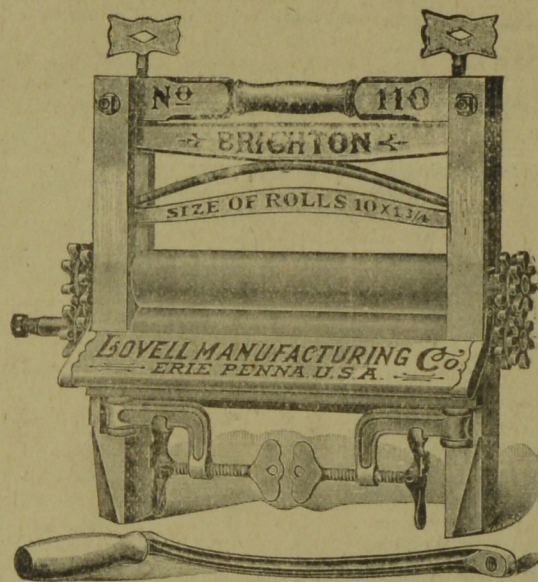
