## GERMANS CLAMORING FOR A SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN

The Hague, via London, Jan. 14.—Berliner Kreuze Zeitung editorially urges the immediate opening of a ruthless submarine campaign by Germany as a reply to the Entente peace demands. It says that owing to German hesitancy in the use of Zeppelins against England, the British have had sufficient time to find a means to foil Zeppelin attacks.

It draws the parallel that unless submarine warfare is undertaken without delay the British will likewise find some new shield against the U-boats.

**Two Submarines Captured.**  
Rome, via Paris, Jan. 14.—The capture of two submarines is reported in an announcement today from the War Office. The statement follows:

"The enemy submarine V-12, which the German navy ceded to Austria-Hungary, has fallen into our hands and became a unit of our torpedo squadron. Another enemy submarine, the V-12, belonging to the Austro-Hungarian navy, also is in our possession."

**Japan Loses Cruiser.**  
Tokio, Jan. 14.—The battle cruiser

Tsukuba, 13,750 tons displacement, was sunk in the harbor at Yokohama today by the explosion of her magazine. The explosion was caused by a fire. It is estimated that more than 100 men were killed or injured.

The Tsukuba was laid down in 1905 and displaced 13,700 tons. She was 440 feet long and armed with four 12-inch, twelve 6-inch, twelve 4.7-inch and four 3-inch guns and five torpedo tubes. Her complement was 817 men.

**Milwaukee a Total Loss.**

Eureka, Cal., Jan. 14.—The United States cruiser Milwaukee, costing approximately \$4,000,000, which went on the shore near here yesterday, will be a total loss, unless she is floated immediately, her commander has advised the navy yard.

Officials say there is no possibility of floating her.

The last member of the crew was landed on the beach last night. Not a life was lost, and but one man was hurt in the rescue of the hundreds on board the stranded vessel.

## NEW YORK AUTO SHOW WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL

Mr. J. Stewart Neill Tells of Improvements in the 1917 Car—A Great Industry.

Mr. J. Stewart Neill, of J. S. Neill & Sons, Ltd., and Mr. W. C. Burt, attended the big automobile show in New York last week. Talking to the Mail in regard to his trip, Mr. Neill described the show as being the largest and most successful ever held on this continent. He said that over 100 manufacturers exhibited more than 400 cars at the show, and they certainly made a fine display. Asked to give some information in regard to changes in the 1917 car, Mr. Neill said:

"The principal changes this year are in the body of the car, and a feature of the show was the numerous body designs. The bodies are roomier in both compartments and detail has been given a great deal more consideration. The three and five passenger roadsters and convertible coupes and sedans are in abundance and seem to be becoming very popular. Slanting windshields also seem to be coming into favor.

"A notable feature is the increased number of manufacturers using thermostatic water control, which does away with the trying ordeal of waiting for the engine to heat up in cold weather.

"Battery ignition and vacuum fall feed have gained great headway, and also the adoption of aluminum pistons. Battery ignition is now being used by 72.2 per cent. of the manufacturers and only 27.8 per cent. are using magrete. Vacuum fuel feed is being used by 74.6 per cent."
