## SEVEN CANDIDATES NAMED FOR TWO ST. JOHN SEATS

Mr. S. E. Elkin and Commissioner Wigmore Chosen as Unionists---Dr. A. F. Emery and Dr. W. P. Broderick, the Straight Liberals---Commissioner McLellan, D. Mullin, K. C. and William Smith Also in the Field.

St. John, Nov. 13.—Stanley E. Elkin was nominated as the Union Liberal candidate for the constituency of St. John-Albert by delegates who withdrew from the Liberal convention last evening after the majority had decided to place two candidates in the field as Laurier Liberals.

The remainder of the delegates proceeded to the nomination of candidates and selected Dr. Alban F. Emery and Dr. William P. Broderick as opponents of the union government, under the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The Liberal convention met in the Moose hall in Charlotte street. There was a large attendance, almost every district being fully represented. The first vote showed a total of 188 delegates present.

After the meeting was called to order by S. E. Elkin, chairman of the Liberal executive, who briefly stated the objects of the gathering, Hon. C. J. Osman, of Hillsboro, Albert county, was selected as chairman and W. M. Ryan as secretary.

A resolution approving the formation of a union government during the continuance of the war and pledging the convention to the support of candidates with that object in view, was presented by J. A. Sinclair and seconded by A. O. Skinner.

A Lively Discussion.  
An amendment to this resolution, calling upon the convention to nominate two straight Liberals as supporters of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was introduced by Arthur W. Carten and vigorously supported by several speakers. A lively discussion followed, the debate being marked by some disorder which emanated chiefly from a group who had refused to leave when those who were not delegates were asked to withdraw. A. M. Belding replied briefly to some of the statements which had been made.

## CRITICISM OF LLOYD GEORGE HAS SUBSIDED

New York, Nov. 15.—An Associated Press cable from London says:

"The storm warning of a ministerial crisis which flared up suddenly as a result of Premier Lloyd George's speech in Paris subsided almost as suddenly. Challenged in the House of Commons yesterday to explain his speech, the Premier contented himself by reading the actual terms of the agreement creating the Allied Council, which, he declared, made it clear that the council was merely advisory and possessed no executive power, and therefore could not override discussions of the representative governments or their military staffs.

Matter was dropped.  
The Premier further offered to submit a letter in the formal debate next Monday if the House desired, and with this offer the matter was dropped. It is assumed that the debate will have a lively character and although the possibility of a crisis is not excluded it is suspended until next week.

The general opinion is that in the present difficult situation, despite the existence of a strong following against the Premier in some quarters, no statesman is anxious to shoulder the heavy responsibilities the Premier holds.

A section of the British press made a great play on the alleged connection of Winston Churchill with the crisis on the ground that he was with Premier Lloyd George at Rapallo and at Paris. An authoritative statement issued last night declared that Mr. Winston Churchill was not at Rapallo and therefore took no part in the conference at which the agreement was reached.

On the division it was found that the amendment had been carried by 130 to 56 ballots.

The names of Dr. A. F. Emery, Dr. W. P. Broderick, W. E. Scully and Lieut. Col. J. L. McAvity, of St. John, and Hon. C. J. Osman and S. S. Ryan, of Albert, were offered in nomination, but that of Lieut. Col. McAvity was withdrawn and the Albert county gentlemen declined to run. When the ballots were counted the standing was: Emery, 120; Broderick, 70, and Scully, 54. Dr. Emery and Dr. Broderick were declared the choice of the convention and this was made practically unanimous.

R. W. Wigmore Chosen.  
The Conservatives in convention selected Commissioner R. W. Wigmore as their candidate on a vote of 134 to 43 cast for Mr. W. F. Hatheway.

Other names proposed were those of Mr. J. Roy Campbell, Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., and H. Colby Smith.

Mr. Daniel Mullin, K. C., has been placed in nomination as a Labor candidate.

Commissioner H. R. McLellan has announced that he will run as an independent Liberal. William Smith, a returned soldier, states that he is also in the field.

Unionist Chosen.  
Montreal, Nov. 15. — Marc G. Crombie of Richmond, Que., was chosen as the Unionist candidate for the united counties of Richmond and Wolfe at a convention at Kingsbury yesterday.

In Jacques Cartier.  
Montreal, Nov. 15. — Aquila Jasmin was nominated the Union candidate for Jacques Cartier division yesterday.

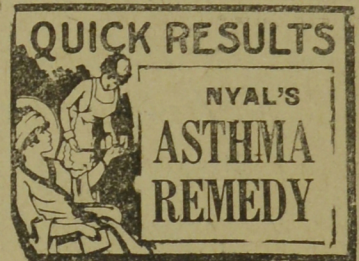
