DUGAL AND MICHAUD DECLARED ELECTED

Sheriff of Madawaska Ignores Objections Raised by Titus Carter and Other Soreheads.

Edmundston, N. B., March 20.—After waiting nearly a month for the announcement, the electors of the county of Madawaska were formally notified this morning that L. A. Dugal and J. E. Michaud, Opposition candidates, had been elected, Charles L. Cyr and Jas. T. Clair, government candidates, losing their deposits. The vote as announced by the returning officer stands as follows:

L. A. Dugal 1805
J. E. Michaud 1792
Charles L. Cyr 682
James T. Clair 662
Declaration proceedings began on the second day of March and were adjourned several times on account of objections raised by Titus J. Carter, A. Chamberland, a lawyer from Grand Falls, and Max D. Cormier, who represented themselves as the agents of Charles L. Cyr, one of the defeated candidates.

The sheriff's announcement was received with great applause by the assembled crowd.

J. E. Michaud thanked those present for the generous support given him and his colleague, Mr. Dugal, who had to leave last night for Toronto with his wounded son, who had returned just a few days ago from the front.

Max D. Cormier, upon whom the returning officer had evidently relied to prepare the proclamation, evidently said that if no date had been set therein for the declaration it was through an oversight of his. He tried to explain why he did not stand by the agreement entered into between himself, Pius Michaud and the returning officer as to the date for the declaration, by saying that at the time he did not have the authority of Mr. Cyr. His last words were drowned by the protests of the audience.

It is reported that an application may be made for a recount if Charles Cyr can be prevailed upon to give his consent and to stand for the expense, but Mr. Cyr is said to be getting tired of his too many advisers and he is likely to cut the comedy short by refusing his consent to the application.

DIED IN STILLWATER, MINN.

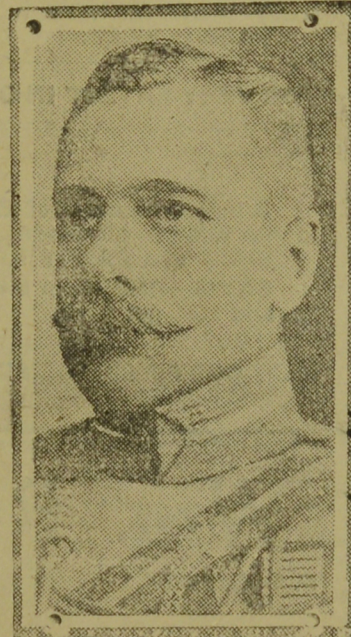
Mrs. John Staples Passed Away Yesterday—Remains Will be Brought to Fredericton.

HON. P. E. BLONDIN MAY GO OVERSEAS

Nationalist Member of Borden Cabinet Tenders His Resignation and May go Overseas.

Ottawa, March 20.—Hon. P. E. Blondin, Postmaster General, has tendered his resignation from the Government in order to serve in overseas forces. This sensational announcement, of which no hint had previously been given, was made in a statement given out tonight by the Minister of Militia, Sir Edward Kemp.

Mr. Blondin has handed in his resignation to the acting premier, Sir Geo. Foster, who has sent a cable message to Sir Robert Borden acquainting him of the situation. To Sir Edward Kemp Mr. Blondin has written the following letter:

"Dear Sir Edward,—I must inform you that I have put my resignation as Postmaster General in the hands of the acting premier in order to offer my services in the overseas forces. I am willing to put myself at your orders and consequently I apply for enlistment in the overseas forces of Canada. Yours truly,

P. E. BLONDIN."

Sir Edward Kemp will ask Mr. Blondin to recruit a battalion for service at the front as a part of the Canadian expeditionary force.

The announcement comes as a big surprise to political circles at the capital. Hon. Messrs. Blondin, Seigney and Patenaude had a long conference this morning with Sir Edward Kemp, at which the proposed move was no doubt discussed from all angles. This afternoon the resignation was written out and tonight came the public announcement.

While Mr. Blondin has made a number of recruiting speeches in the province of Quebec, his record as a Nationalist and his general Nationalistic attitude, would not indicate that his enlistment is due purely to a desire to render personal service at the front. His example in enlisting should, however, if considered to be in all good faith, have a good effect in Quebec.

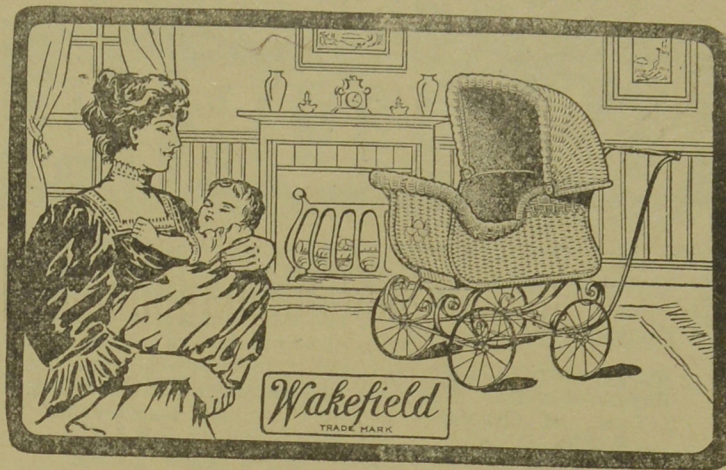
SUCCESSFUL ENTERTAINMENT.

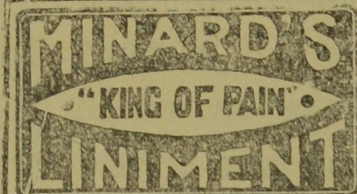
