GENERAL MAUDE AND THE
MESOPOTAMIA CAMPAIGN

Nature was the Enemy That Caused the Surrender of Townshend at Kut-el-Amara.

Hats off to Major General Frederick Stanley Maude, who has re-established the credit of British arms in Mesopotamia. There has, of course, been a good deal of misapprehension about the first Mesopotamia campaign. It was not so great a failure as many who pay little attention to the military situation imagine.

It is true that on April 30th last, General Townshend—by the way, a descendant of another General Townshend, who took part in the capture of Quebec—was forced to surrender at Kut-el-Amara. General Aylmer's failure to relieve Townshend was tragic, but it would be almost as unjust to blame him for that failure as it would have been to blame Col. Goethals for the disasters which delayed the completion of the Panama Canal. In both cases Nature was the enemy.

With Aylmer's relief column twenty miles away, Townshend was compelled to surrender because the erratic floods of the Tigris barred the immediate possibility of rescue. Yet the Turks were unable to follow up their victory. The British retained their hold on lower Mesopotamia and the Persian Gulf, and kept possession of the precious oil fields, an essential source of supply for the British navy. It does seem to be clear that the Mesopotamia adventure was embarked upon hastily, and with very inadequate preparation. Whether it, like the Dardanelles campaign, was urgently required to aid Russia by keeping the Turks busy at home, history will show.

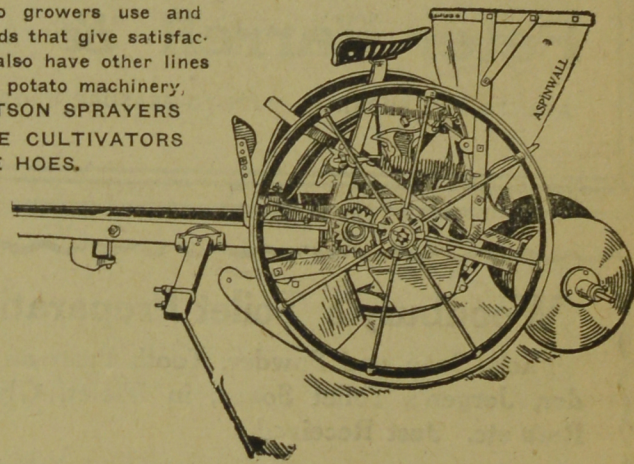

RULING CLASS IN PRUSSIA
ON THE DEFENSIVE

Events in Russia are Causing Them to Promise Great Reforms "After the War."

(Boston Record.)

The ruling caste in Prussia, quick to perceive the significance of the revolution in Russia, is volubly promising internal reforms "after the war."

Prussia's mediaeval system of block voting, by which power is confirmed in the hands of reactionary land owners and in large measure denied to the great majority who do the hard work of the kingdom, is to be revised liberally "after the war."

The miracle of unity of interest between those who live in the fat enjoyment of valuable privileges inherited or bestowed, and those who live in the sweat of arduous toil, is to be wrought somehow—means not specified—"after the war."

"Just be patient and accept our promises," says the ruling caste to the hungry people.

Similar promises have been abundant in Russia, but have partaken of the nature of "scraps of paper." The people of Russia decided to work out their own freeing, which is the only stable

base.

Prediction would be futile as to whether Prussians are likely to console themselves on a diet of promises or imitate the Russian example. The significant thing is that Prussian autocracy should be so ready to admit that it is on the defensive.

NEWS WITHHELD
FROM GERMAN PEOPLE

Berlin, via London, March 20.—The morning newspapers today gave the German public its first news of the big events on the front in France. All the published articles by military experts explain the movement as part of the strategical plan of the general staff for a decision on the western front, and a master stroke to vitiate the preparations of the entente for an offensive, giving a decided advantage to the Germans. These writers are unanimous in expressing the fullest confidence in Field Marshal Von Hindenburg.
