

## PUBLIC NOTICE.

FOLLOWING is a list of the Enumerators for York-Sunbury, appointed under the Dominion Election Act for the Election to be held on December 17th, with the names of the Polling Districts. The Voters' Lists to be used at the coming election consist of the names on the lists used at the Provincial Election last February, and to these the Enumerator is not allowed to add any other name than those of female voters qualified to vote under the present Act. Under this Act every female person is qualified to vote in the present Election who, being a British subject, twenty-one years of age, and a resident of New Brunswick since February 24th, 1917, is the wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter of any person, male or female (living or dead) who is serving or has served without Canada in any of the Military Forces, or within or without Canada in any of the Naval Forces of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war, if the name of such person is duly entered on the Voters' List in the electoral district in which she is bona fide resident or domiciled.

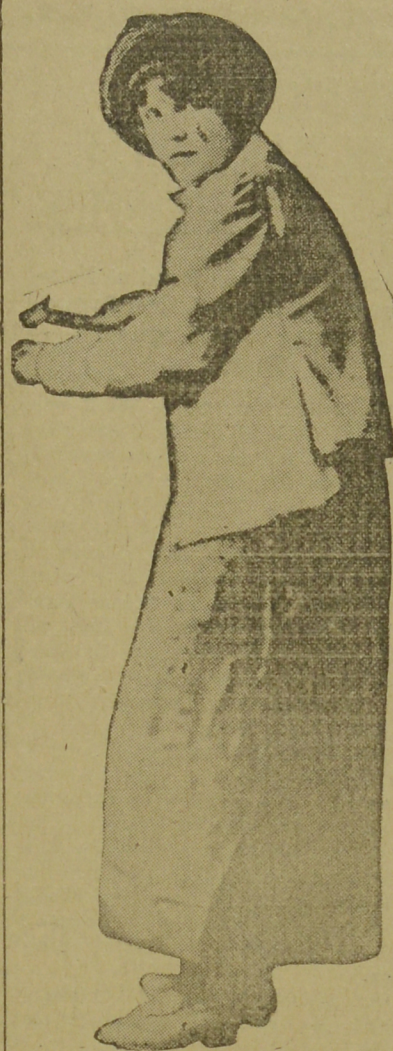
