Halifax, Sept. 12. — Three thousand persons today witnessed the horse races on the exhibition track. During the afternoon over 100 returned officers and men were on the platform and brief addresses were delivered by Lieut. Governor Grant, Mayor Martin and Rev. Dr. Forrest. On behalf of the city the returned heroes were presented with recognition cards and all received an enthusiastic welcome.
