THE LAST OF THE CORN.

Can you still get corn on the cob?
If you can, eat it abundantly, for there
is something about fresh corn that
cannot be equalled.

Corn Pudding.

For a delicious corn pudding slit
lengthwise the grains in 8 large ears
of full, but not old, corn. Then scrape
out the pulp, and be sure to save all
the milk that runs with it.

Beat about three eggs until light,
add 1 tablespoonful of sugar, ½ tea-
spoonful of salt, black pepper and
paprika, ½ cupful of thin, sweet cream
and ½ cupful of soft butter.

Add the corn, pour into a pudding
dish and bake for 10 minutes.

Corn Fritters.

An easily prepared dainty is corn
fritters. Cut the corn from the boiled
cob. Never cut clear to the cob, but
cut off part of each kernel. Then
with the back of a silver knife rub
the cob lengthwise to extract the rest
of the kernels.

To 2 cupfuls of corn add 1 cupful of
milk, pepper and salt to taste, 1½
tablespoonfuls flour and 2 beaten eggs.
Fry brown, dropping the batter from
a tablespoon. A delicious way to serve
corn fritters for luncheon is to cook
bacon until it is crisp in a big frying
pan, then remove it to a hot platter
and cook the fritters in the hot bacon
fat.

Corn Soup.

Corn soup is another dish to make
of cooked corn. Cut the kernels from
the cobs and run them through a
vegetable cutter two or three times.
Then press through a vegetable press
and simmer gently with a slice of
onion, a sprig of parsley and 1 pint of
water for 2 cupfuls of corn.

Cucumber Salad.

Chill the cucumbers and slice them
thin and place on crisp, white lettuce
leaves. Sprinkle with chopped pimen-
tos and serve with French dressing.

WAR CAKE.

Two cups brown sugar, 2 cups hot
water, 2 tablespoons lard, 1 package
seedless raisins, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tea-
spoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves.
Boil all ingredients 5 minutes after
they begin to bubble. When cold add
2½ cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, dis-
solved in 1 teaspoonful hot water.
Bake in two loaves 45 minutes in a
slow oven.

BLANKET CLASPS.

A splendid little appliance which
would relieve mother of many anxious
moments consists of a set of four
blanket clasps.

On both ends of four stout knitted
strips about five inches long and half
an inch wide, are string steel clasps
something like your own garter snaps.
One end of each strip is to be clasped
to the baby's blanket, the other to be
clasped to the crib, thus insuring baby
a warm sleep and mother a restful
night.

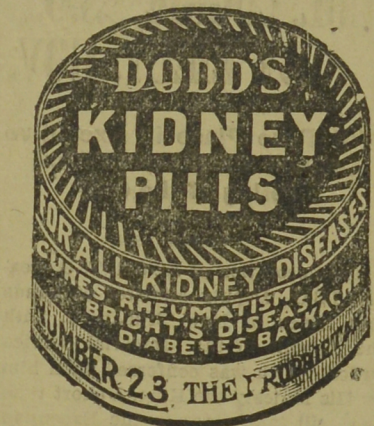

JOE EAGAN PUT K.O. ON CHONSKI

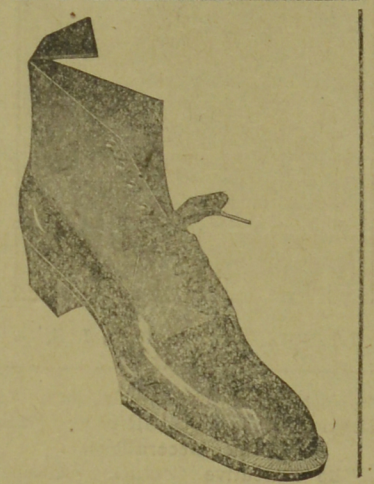
Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 11. — Joe

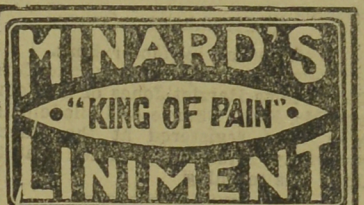
