CITY FATHERS CONSIDERED MANY MATTERS OF INTEREST

Finance Committee Empowered to Expend One Thousand Dollars Upon Revaluation of Real Estate--Complaint That Bread By-law is Not Enforced in Regard to the Marking of Weight on Loaves--Minchin Fund Smaller.

The City Council had a fairly lengthy meeting last night at which a number of important matters came up. The weight of bread and the enforcement of the by-law relating to its sale were among them. No action was taken in this matter, Bread Inspector Roberts being requested to furnish a report at the October meeting. A motion to make one pound and a half the weight of the standard loaf in Fredericton was not pressed. The opinion was expressed that the existing bread law was not being enforced so far as the marking of the loaves was concerned.

A report from Ald. Reid showed that at some time in the past the sum of one thousand dollars had been borrowed from the Minchin Fund, the proceeds of a bequest for the purpose of maintaining the Old Protestant Bury-

ing Ground, and never had been returned.

The matter of revaluation for assessment purposes was discussed and the Finance Committee authorized to expend an amount not exceeding one thousand dollars upon a revaluation of real estate.

The special committee having in hand the matters of purchase of a pulmotor, the provision of an isolation hospital and the erection of bathing houses was continued, Ald. Baxter reporting.

Ald. Walker, the Dean of Aldermen, was in the chair as acting mayor, His Worship Mayor Mitchell not being in the city. Others present were Ald. Lemont, Ald. McLellan, Ald. Reid, Ald. Wilkinson, Ald. Everett, Ald. Baxter and Ald. Burnett.

Municipal Home.

For the Municipal Home Committee Ald. Baxter reported that expenditure in his department during the month of August had been as follows: Outside relief, \$93.00; at the Home \$93.40; total \$186.40. On his motion a cheque for \$200 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

Ald. Reid reported as follows on tax collections:

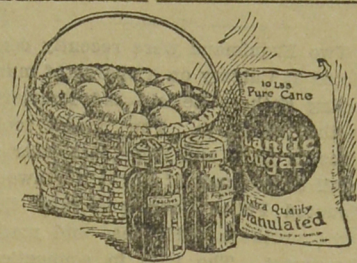

Minchin Fund.

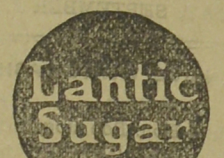
Ald. Reid reported on the Minchin Fund. Mortgages to the amount of \$1,870 had been left the city to keep in repair the graves and tombstones of the members of the benefactor's family and to beautify the Old Protestant cemetery. Of that amount only \$700 remained. At some time \$1,000 had been borrowed by the city at interest from the Fund but never had been returned. He believed that it would be only fair to return the amount to the Fund. He intended to report further on the matter at the next meeting.

Special Committee.

For the special committee appointed to consider the matter of furnishing bathing houses for the West End beach, Ald. Baxter reported that it had been found impossible to secure boat houses for temporary purposes and that the erection of buildings on the beach was the best solution of the problem, but that the season was so far advanced that nothing would be done. For the same, committee Ald. Baxter reported that he had inquired

concerning the purchase of a pulmotor and had been quoted prices by a local

druggist, Mr. C. F. Chestnut. The price was \$135. It was suggested by other aldermen that further information be secured. Concerning the isolation hospital, Ald. Baxter reported that the old building had been inspected and had been found in a most dilapidated condition. General discussion followed on this question. Ald. Wilkinson expressed the opinion that the old building should not be used, the city of Fredericton being able to furnish something better. Ald. Burnett suggested building a new structure of smaller size on another site.

No action on any of these matters was taken and Ald. Baxter's committee was continued.

Ald. Lemont brought up the matter of revaluation for purposes of assessment. He believed that the matter should be proceeded with at once without waiting for expert opinion. The two assessors, Messrs. H. C. Mackey and Peter Farrell, could accomplish much if they went to work at once. He did not doubt that they could find

buildings that were not assessed at all.

Ald. Everett agreed that much valuable information could be obtained.

On the motion of Ald. Burnett the Finance Committee was empowered to expend an amount not to exceed \$1,000 on assessment revaluation.

Bread By-law.

Ald. Everett moved that the by-law relating to the sale of bread be amended so as to require all loaves of bread to be marked with the initials of the baker and be of the standard weight of one pound and a half.

Ald. Burnett opposed the motion. All that was necessary was enforcement of the existing by-law.

Ald. Wilkinson said that Bread Inspector Roberts must be lax in not requiring the existing law to be observed.

On the motion of Ald. McLellan action on the matter was deferred until the next meeting of the City Council, Inspector Roberts to bring in a report at that time.

The Council then adjourned.
