To Stop the Light Nuisance.

Police Magistrate Limerick is determined to put a stop to the nuisance of glaring headlights on motor cars about the city streets. Many persons think that there is no law against such lights but an act was passed by the Legislature in June which governs the matter. Under it no lights can be on at full force on Queen street, the law stating that the lights must be dimmed when the car meets any person.

Motorists to Be in Court.

Seven cases against motorists are to be heard in the police court tomorrow and two more on Friday. The violations of the Motor Vehicles and other acts are varied. They are driving on the wrong side of the street, turning a street corner improperly, driving recklessly, driving without lights. Two cases are for using a dealer's tag on a private car. A Keswick physician is a defendant in two cases and a professional man of Fredericton is the defendant in four cases.

Pte. H. J. Duplisea Dies

Another soldier of that gallant company, the Princess Pats, has gone to his reward in the passing of Private Harold J. Duplisea, who died Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the St. John Public Hospital from the effects of gas which he inhaled at the first battle of Ypres, when the Princess Pats, in a glorious fight, were practically wiped out. Pte. Duplisea was one of 107 of the Princess Pats who survived the memorable conflict and he suffered wounds from a shell explosion and was badly gassed. He was one of the special guards at the Legislative Buildings in this city for a time and while on that duty had a severe attack of illness.

On Red Cross Commission.

Word has been received here that Dr. J. W. Inches of St. Clair, Mich., who is a prominent property holder and a native of Fredericton, has been appointed to the Red Cross Commission which will go to France in the near future to investigate conditions on the western front and report on the needs of the American Red Cross Society in that section. Dr. Inches is health officer of the city of Detroit, but it is expected that he will retain that appointment during his absence. For some time past he has been in camp with the Detroit College of Medicine and Surgery Base Hospital Unit No. 36. He will resign his appointment with that but will remain a captain in the reserve medical services.

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DR. ROBERTSON IN CONFERENCE THIS AFTERNOON

Representative Men From All Over Province—Food Conservation, Greater Production, etc.

Dr. J. W. Robertson of Ottawa, arrived in Fredericton this morning and this afternoon is holding a conference with representative men from various sections of the province. The conference is three-fold in its scope, being on the subjects, Food Conservation, Greater Production of Food Products and Belgian and Serbian Relief After the War.

The conference is being held at the Department of Agriculture. Among those expected to be in attendance are Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. W. R. Reek, Secretary for Agriculture, Mr. R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the St. John Board of Trade, Col. O. W. Wetmore of Clifton, Mr. C. S. Shaw of Hartland, Mr. G. S. Fisher of Chatham, Mr. R. A. Caldwell of Florenceville, president of the Potato Growers' Association, Mr. F. Peacock of Fredericton, director of Manual Training, Mr. W. W. Boyce of Fredericton.

COL. T. G. LOGGIE NOW OF IMPERIAL SERVICE ORDER

Honored for Forty-six Years in Colonial Civil Service—His Appointment Gazetted Saturday.

Lt.-Col. T. G. J. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines for the Province of New Brunswick, has been appointed by His Majesty the King a Companion of the Imperial Service Order. The appointment was gazetted at Ottawa on Saturday last and at London on May 31st.

This honor has been conferred on Col. Loggie on account of his long and honorable connection with the Colonial Civil Service. He was appointed to a position in the Crown Land Office now the Department of Lands and Mines, in 1871, as draftsman. Nine years ago he was appointed deputy head of the department after thirty-seven years' service in various capacities. The decoration conferred upon him comes after service of forty-six years' duration.

Col. Loggie besides being in the civil service, has had a long connection with the military forces of Canada. In the 71st York Regt. he rose from private to officer commanding, retiring several years ago upon completing his term in command. During his career in the militia he was selected three times to represent Canada as a member of the rifle team which competed at Wimbledon.

The colonel is being heartily congratulated upon the honor he has received.

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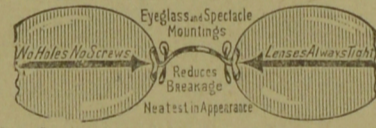
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
