DOMINION ALLIANCE COUNCIL IN SESSION HERE YESTERDAY

Annual Convention to Take Place at New-castle December 5th and 6th—Members of Alliance Satisfied with Progress Made in Province Towards Prohibition.

The Council of the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance met on Tuesday, September 25th, in the Brunswick Street Baptist Church, Fredericton. The meeting was called to order at 10.15 a. m. by Rev. Thomas Marshall, 1st Vice President. After devotional exercises the roll was called and twenty persons answered to their names. Rev. C. Flemington, Secretary of the Alliance, read the Minutes of the last Council meeting. Communications were received from the Rev. P. R. Hayward of St. John, Rev. W. P. McVie of Point de Butte, Rev. Percy Fitzpatrick of Moncton, signifying their inability to attend.

Report of Executive

The Rev. H. C. Archer presented the report of the Executive which was as follows:—
 "To the Council of the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance.

Dear Fellow Workers:—

We beg to submit to you the following report:—

(1) Since last we met in Council much work has been accomplished.

(2) At the Council meeting last April, it was decided to recommend our General Secretary to the Government for the position of Chief Inspector. To this recommendation the Government agreed, and Rev. W. D. Wilson was appointed and began the work at once and has since satisfactorily filled the duties of his office.

(3) A campaign of advertising has been carried out throughout the whole of this Province. Practically every newspaper inserted our advertisements and we anticipate much good as the result of this work. The extra expense of this campaign has been met by a special fund.

(4) Since our last meeting some amendments to the Prohibition Act were suggested by your committee and were carried through the Legislature. These amendments were for the purpose of strengthening the Act. One provides that the mails shall not be used for circulating liquor advertisements in Provinces where such advertisements are prohibited. The other authorizes that a prosecution for any offense under this Act may be brought and a conviction had in the City, Town or other place from which any intoxicating liquor is unlawfully sent or in the place where such intoxicating liquor is so sent or the place in which the accused resides.

(5) Amendments to the Scott Act were also suggested to the Minister of Justice, some of which passed the House of Commons and the Senate, and have been concurred in, and are now part of the Law.

(6) It would seem advisable to your Executive that this Council should place itself on record as uttering its protest at the action of the Senate in cutting out two of the most important amendments to the Doherty Act. These amendments were passed by the House of Commons and were needed to supplement and facilitate the working of the Prohibition Laws of the various Provinces, but were rejected by the Senate.

(7) Scott Act elections have been held in Sunbury and Charlotte Counties and in the City of Fredericton. In each case the repeal vote was successful. Petitions have gone forward to Ottawa from York, Carleton and Northumberland Counties and in all other Counties, now under the Scott Act. Petitions are in course of preparation and will soon be ready for presentation. It is not expected that an election will be necessary in these or any other Counties because of the amendments made to the Doherty Act which provides that on the receipt of the required number of signatures to a petition for a repeal, the Scott Act may be suspended so long as the Prohibitory Law remains in force.

(8) We wish to express our appreciation of the invaluable help and co-operation of the Police Forces in St. John and elsewhere, as well as the faithful, impartial and efficient manner in which police magistrates and other officials concerned with the administration of justice have performed their duty. We also wish to express our appreciation of the splendid co-operation of the public. Whatever success has come is due in a great measure to the patriotic, self-sacrificing spirit of the general public as well as to the efficient work done by the several Inspectors.

(9) One of the gratifying features of this movement has been the co-operation of both political parties in this province, and the executive of the Al-

liance express the hope that partisan politics will be more and more eliminated from this and other kindred work.

(10) We are at a critical period in our work where greatest wisdom is necessary to consolidate what has already been won and to plan for further aggressive action and every possible effort must be made to sustain and carry on the work, and it is very desirable that all our criticisms be on the constructive side. Much has been done, but much still remains to be done and whilst financial help is necessary and indispensable we need most of all the consecrated work and prayers and sympathy of the citizens.

(11) We desire to express our appreciation of the generous way in which contributions have been made towards the carrying on of the work of the Alliance.

(12) It will be for the council of the Alliance to consider the various reports to be presented at this meeting and to plan wisely and generously for the continued carrying on of this work, which will not have fully accomplished its purpose until we have a Dominion-wide Prohibitory Law efficiently carried out.

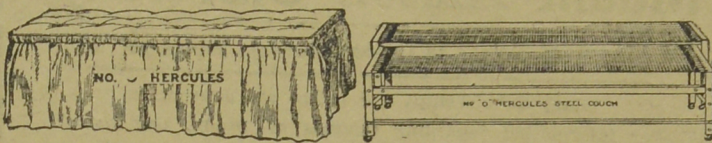
