VETERAN GUIDE HAS A MOST UNIQUE RECORD

Mr. Henry Braithwaite of this City Has Been Hunting Big Game for the Past Sixty Years.

Mr. Henry Braithwaite, the celebrated guide of this city, will start for the Miramichi woods this evening with a party of sportsmen from Pittsburg, who have engaged his services for the next four weeks. Mr. Braithwaite is in his seventy-seventh year and today is beginning his sixty-fourth season as a guide and hunter of big game. It is doubtful if a parallel for his case can be found on this continent. He shot his first caribou when thirteen years of age and ever since that time he has earned his living in the woods. He is New Brunswick's foremost woodsman, and is a recognized authority on all matters pertaining to the fauna of this province.

Was Out With Gabe

"Uncle Henry," as he is familiarly called, served his apprenticeship as a guide with the late Sachem Gabe, the noted Melicite Indian Hunter, who died on the reserve at St. Marys a few years ago. One of his first expeditions to the woods was made in company with the Governor Manners-Sutton, who in his day was noted as a keen sportsman. He has the distinction of being the first white man to guide a non-resident sportsman into the woods of this province. Many noted hunters from the United States and Great Britain have been Mr. Braithwaite's companions on hunting trips and have admired and praised his knowledge and skill in the art of woodcraft.
