insult offered to one of cabinet timber in the Canadian Parliament whose offer to sell 10,000,000 bushels of wheat to the British government had been turned down, the premier of Britain deciding to buy in the open market where he was sure he could get better value. He bought in the open market and bought cheaper even with the inflation of price caused by the heavy buying and the leader of the Union government helped the man or cabinet timber out, no other than R. B. Bennett of Calgary who, with Max Aitken holds the controlling interest in the Alberta Elevator Company, but the premier caused the tariff on wheat to be taken off and so automatically removed the United States tax on wheat going in from Canada. The result must have been the clearing up of nearly \$100,000,000 by the Elevator Company.

The H. C. of L.

The leader of the Union government is further to be charged with failing to deal with the great problems of the Dominion. The cost of living has gone up at a rate that is alarming. Although we have not the submarine peril to deal with in our domestic life and have nothing much to charge up to the high freight rates as they have on the continent of Europe the cost of living in Canada today is higher than the cost of living in Great Britain. While the government has appointed a food controller he has condemned himself as no other has ever done. In the Canadian press only a short time ago Mr. Hanna stated causes for the high cost of living two of which were the root causes as all the others related themselves to these two, namely: The large number of middlemen, and the profiteers. Now it must be remembered that Mr. Hanna was, it was said, given unlimited powers yet he said that he could not interfere as it would disturb the

whole social life. He is in the same place as the doctor who, seeing an awful cancer in one near and dear to him, who though sure that he can remedy the evil by eradication says: It would be too painful, and permits the friend to die. It is sure murder and that is the charge to be levelled at Mr. Borden through his inefficient food controller.

Further, Mr. Borden has failed to deal with the great industrial problems of our country. We should have had great shipbuilding yards where we could turn out the ships which would be our part of reconstruction in the time of shipping loss through the submarine. In this field we were the last instead of being the first.

The great industries of Canada also have suffered to an alarming extent through the inefficiency of the minister of labor. We have had all kinds of strikes both east and west where we ought to have had peace. The leader of the government, despite the fact that he is responsible for the increase in the cost of living has done nothing other than promise that if returned to power he will look into this.

In the time of want the leader of the government has, because he has refused to do his duty, allowed thousands of tons of foodstuffs to be ruined because there was not the proper help given at the proper time. Hay and grain crops could not be got in.

The Temperance Question.
In the matter of temperance, while the whole country has been ripe for it the leader has shuffled and shuffled and practically done nothing like he should. We do admit that the food controller after a long time when, unless he would grant something all would have been wasted, he has said there is to be no more grain used in Canada for the manufacture of intoxicating liquors, after the women of Canada refused to pledge themselves until restrictions were placed on the distilleries.

The C. N. R. Deal.

We have the Canadian Northern bill which is admittedly one of the most monstrous of financial bills yet put through any parliament. We have according to the word of Premier Borden in 1914-15 a great system which is to belong to Canada and will be taken possession of by Canada if there is any default. There was default and the premier who said it was to belong to the people desires to pay a second time for it and add millions to millions already stolen from the Canadian treasury. Against this deal which was to boost the stock of the C.N.R. and enable the Canadian financiers to clear up added millions across the best minded men and the strongest forces in Canada in open protest. Still the deal known as the greatest Canadian steal has been carried through.

The Franchise Bill.

But all sinks into insignificance as we face the franchise bill which has been the most atrocious of all measures. As it goes out into the future lays the precedent for all manner of political buffoonery that the meanest of men may use to keep themselves in a false position.

The national jury has been picked by the convict who will make it impossible to get any semblance of justice. Not only so but he has chosen from those whose minds have been set on fire, boys who have not followed the mazy track of Canadian politics for the past three years, men who have had their brains set on fire by the developments of the great war, and women who have as girls been carried into the marriage state by excitement, not by love, and mothers whose brains have been set on fire by the war and most of them made irrational by their own suffering and the outbursts of a partisan leader who will stoop to anything to win the election which by his partisanship he forced upon the country.

He has taken the vote from men who had every claim for it, men who have been decent citizens and above reproach and with greater rights than the Outlanders in South Africa who brought us the South African war.

When he has gone to the depths the premier digs still deeper and gains the power to manipulate the votes that are given to the government from the battle front. He, of course, is the man who filled every office he could with partisans and then calls for a non-partisan government.

The Labor Question.

He is the man who most flagrantly broke his word to Labor and to his opponent in the House of Commons. He promised when he asked for the extension of parliament in 1916 that nothing of a partisan character should be brought before the House and yet he pushed through the partisan appointments to the Senate and then brought in the conscription of manhood bill, betraying in his greed for the supreme power the man who had despite all the evil done supported him in the carrying out of the program for the war—Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The Franchise Bill as also the other evils perpetrated by the premier of the Dominion were all condemned by the leading men in the new Union government, which indicates that there is something rotten in the state of Denmark. One thing must be noticed here and that is that the Montreal Daily Star, a Conservative paper in referring recently to the Franchise Bill said that though evidently efforts at union had broken down the new Franchise bill might force union. If the union was forced by unjust means then it is no true union. The men who form that Union government therefore must be condemned.

I think it has been proven that the leader of the so-called Union government is a coward in that he has not battled with and destroyed the forces that are destroying our Dominion life, he is foolish in that he tramples upon

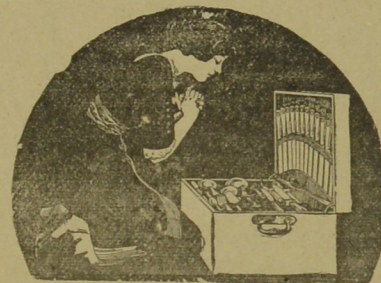
