Voters' Lists Posted.

The voters' lists in each of the polling districts of the constituency were posted today by the enumerators in accordance with the provisions of the Elections Act. The lists show that there are 2,819 qualified voters in the city of Fredericton, 1,538 in Division No. 1, west of Carleton street and 2,128 in Division No. 2, east of Carleton street. The women qualified to vote number 784, of whom 363 are in Division No. 1 and 421 in Division No. 2. At the last election there were nine polls in the city. On December 17th there will be several others on account of the increased list.

Dibblee-Munro.

The marriage of Miss Mary Caroline Munro, only daughter of Mr. Donald Munro, and Mr. George Allan Dibblee took place in St. Paul's Presbyterian church, Woodstock, on Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock. The bride, attired in her travelling suit of brown broadcloth with black hat and carrying a bride's bouquet of pink roses, entered the church on the arm of her father, while the choir sang "The Voice that Breathed O'er Eden." The ceremony was performed by Rev. Frank Baird. The bridegroom is a son of the late J. T. Allan Dibblee, and a nephew of Mr. G. Y. Dibblee of this city.

Died in Hospital.

The sad occurred at Victoria Hospital Sunday morning after a week's illness from tumor on the brain of Mrs. Hattie C. M. Crouse, beloved wife of Mr. Percy Crouse of Barker's Point, at the age of eighteen years and six months. HAS SURPASSED
EXPECTATIONS

Victory Loan Subscriptions Will Exceed \$1,200,000—Full Statement Will be Issued.

The exact result of the Victory Loan campaign in York and Sunbury counties will not be known until tomorrow or Wednesday, but it is known now that the district far exceeded the expectations of the organizers of the campaign. Up to Saturday night the exact amount secured in subscriptions and reported was \$1,140,626. With amounts being reported by mail today it is safe to say that the total will exceed \$1,200,000.

Expectations Exceeded.

The amount expected of York and Sunbury counties was in the neighborhood of \$600,000 or \$700,000, and the response has been about twice as generous as was expected. The largest individual subscription was \$25,000, and it was the only one of that size. This shows that in these two counties the subscriptions to the loan have been well distributed throughout the population.

By Wednesday the local headquarters of the fund will be in a position to issue to the press a statement showing the subscriptions by districts and the number of individual subscribers.

SGT. J. CONNOLLY
IS REPORTED AS
KILLED NOV. 15

Leaves Widow in This City—Formerly with R. C. R.—Pte. Douglas McConaghey is Missing.

Mrs. Grace Connolly, of 643 Charlotte street, yesterday received official information to the effect that her husband, Sergt. John Connolly, had been killed in action in France Nov. 15th.

The regimental number in the telegram was not that of Sergt. Connolly, and it is thought that there still is a chance that a mistake has been made. Sergt. Connolly was a native of Liverpool, Eng., but had been stationed in Fredericton with the Royal Canadian Regiment for a number of years before the outbreak of the war. When his regiment was sent to Bermuda on garrison duty early in the war he accompanied it and later returned to Canada and then went to France. He was a fine type of soldier.

Pte. Douglas McConaghey Missing.

Private Douglas McConaghey, of Fredericton, is reported missing since October 30th. He is a son of the late Andrew McConaghey and is one of three brothers enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force. The others are Parker McConaghey, of the Fredericton post office staff, returned from France with wounds, and Frank McConaghey, with the 236th McLean Highlanders, now in England. The missing soldier left Canada with the 55th Battalion but later transferred to the Royal Canadian Regiment.
