BIG GROWERS OF GARDEN TRUCK

Market Gardeners of Maugeville District Easily Lead the Whole Province in Their Line.

The market gardeners of Maugeville, report that the present season has not been as favorable for their work as last year. They shipped large quantities of tomatoes, cabbage and cucumbers to the St. John market, but about a fortnight ago the price took a drop and they were compelled to stop shipment as after the slump there was not sufficient in it to pay for the packing and shipping charges. Strange to say, about the time the price sagged the tomato plants were struck by rust.

Messrs. A. and C. A. Harrison of Maugeville are the largest growers of garden veg tables in the province. This season they will have 25,000 head of cabbage, a goodly percentage of which they have already marketed. They also grow in large quantities tomatoes, cucumbers, corn, spinach, peppers and parsley. The vegetables are started in hothouses and are ready for market in midsummer.

Mr. D. M. Seeley, who occupies the Thurott farm at Maugeville, is also an extensive grower of garden produce. Mr. Seeley marketed several hundred boxes of ripe tomatoes in August, besides hundreds of barrels of cucumbers and cabbages. He expects to ship about two hundred barrels of green tomatoes before the season ends.

The daily steamboat service on the river is a great convenience to the market gardeners of Maugeville and Sheffield. In fact if there were no boat on the river it would be impossible for them to market the immense quantity of produce which they raise each year.

A few days ago Hon. Mr. Tweeddale Minister of Agriculture, accompanied by his deputy, Mr. W. R. Reek, and Mr. Thomas Hetherington, livestock superintendent, paid a visit to Maugeville and inspected the Harrison and Seeley farms. It was their first visit to the locality and they were amazed when told of the vast quantities of garden produce which is grown in the district. "I have seen the garden of the province," were the words which Hon. Mr. Tweeddale afterward used in describing his trip.

Mr. Seeley told a representative of The Mail that he had been farming at Maugeville for a number of years but he had never before seen a Minister of Agriculture or one of his officials in that vicinity. "I think," he said, "that we now have a live man at the head of the Agricultural Department."

NEW ENGLAND SPECIAL NUMBER

Breath o' the Heather Commemorates 236th Highlanders' American Recruiting Campaign.

Commemorating a most successful recruiting campaign in the United States when in less than two weeks the Maclean Kilties of America added 670 names to its muster roll from among British and Canadian residents in the United States, and brought the 236th Battalion up to war strength the last issue of the regimental journal, "Breath O' The Heather" is a splendid souvenir as well as an historical piece of military literature. There are over 46 pages of illustrations and text bound in a striking seven color cover—being a reproduction of the brilliant tartan of the Macleans of Duart. The Kilties were the first military unit in Canada authorized by the government to seek recruits across the border and the publication tells the story of their work with graphic pictures of recruiting scenes in Greater Boston, New Bedford and Bangor, besides many illustrations of the regimental depot at Fredericton and the boys in their training camp on the plains of Valcartier, P. Q. A four page supplement carries photographs of His Excellency Governor Samuel W. McCall of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and Mayor James M. Curley of the city of Boston—the two heads who extended a welcome and helping hand to the Kilties in their respective official capacities. As a record of achievement in securing over 4,300 recruits for the armies of Great Britain and Canada besides hundreds for Uncle Sam's new fighting forces the publication is a unique one and will be treasured by every friend of New Brunswick's last volunteer infantry unit—which today is a truly international fighting force including as it does, recruits from every province of the Dominion. Captain Percy F. Godenrath, as manager of the Kilties' regimental paper, is responsible for the August number, having been specially detailed by Lieut. Col. Guthrie to secure the material and photographs when recruiting in Boston, for the regimental records.

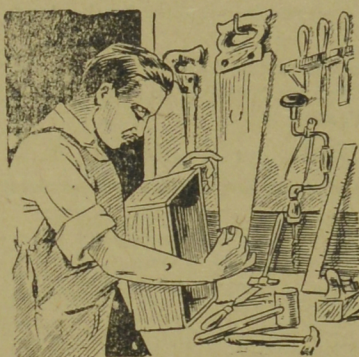
