CORWIN HAL HAS RECOVERED, WILL RACE AT HALIFAX

S. A. Rockford, Owner and Driver, Passed Through Moncton with Him—Has Recovered.

Corwin Hal which was supposed to have injured himself so severely when racing here a few weeks ago, that his racing days were over, is now as good as ever. The Moncton Transcript has the following:

"Prof. Rockford, one of the best known horsemen on Prince Edward Island, arrived in Moncton this morning from Chatham. He has with him his famous Corwin Hal, which has a record of 2.13 1/4, the horse having recovered from the accident he had in Fredericton, and will proceed from here to Halifax where he will take part in the exhibition races."

ATHLETE TRAINS RUNNING FARM

Chicago, Sept. 7.—Arlie Mucks, the giant Wisconsin football player and champion discus thrower and shot-putter, who took to farming last spring to do his bit, is a serious tiller of the soil near Mitchell, S. D.

He and "Red" Kelly, another Wisconsin football player, borrowed \$3,000 and leased a 320-acre farm. They hired a college mate as cook and house manager and personally put under cultivation 245 acres.

Unless something unforeseen happens, they will pay off their indebtedness and make a handsome profit.

They plan to work a bigger farm next year.

Working the farm will be Muck's training for the A. A. U. championships of 1918.

BONEHEAD IS OBJECTIONABLE

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 7.—The Birds' chances of winning the pennant have been probably seriously affected by the defection of Outfielder Lamar.

The hard hitting left fielder has decided to retire for the season because of a row with Manager Dunn. He objected to being publicly called a "bonehead" and handed in his uniform after the reprimand. With the big series with Providence opening up today the Birds will be weakened as a result of his absence. Dunn's methods of handling his players, though they bring results, are too arbitrary to suit the majority of the fans.

DAN TIPPLE NOW IS IRON MAN

Lazy Dan Tipple, who was a benchwarmer with the Toronto club for more than half the season, seems to have recovered from the "sleeping sickness" which made him of little or no use to the Toronto club since his release to Baltimore. He performed the "Iron man" stunt for the Birds this week, defeating Newark in both ends of a double-header by 8 to 3 and 8 to 2 respectively. The Birds pounded Smallwood, Pennington and McGraw for thirteen hits in the first game, and made fourteen off Ross in the second. Tipple restricted the Bears to eight "blows" in the first and eleven in the second game.

TILLMAN WON FROM WHITE

Philadelphia, Sept. 5.—Johnny Tillman of Minneapolis had the better of Charley White of Chicago in a six-round bout here tonight. Both men weighed in at 138 pounds this afternoon.

BIG SHIPPING CORPORATION

San Francisco, Sept. 7.—A twenty million dollar corporation to operate ships between San Francisco and the Orient, has been formed by seven Japanese who have amassed fortunes in the shipping boom in the far east, according to Teiji Ishida, president of the concern, who was in San Francisco today to establish an American office.

TED LEWIS HAD FOUR BOUTS IN SEVEN DAYS

Game Little Britisher Who Holds the World's Welterweight Title, Has Eight More in Sight.

Four fights in seven days! That is the record which Ted Lewis, welterweight champion of the world, hung up during the past week. On Tuesday night of last week he fought Mike O'Dowd, a man fifteen pounds heavier than himself, twelve rounds at Boston; on Friday night he knocked out Albert Badoud, the welterweight champion of Europe, in one round at the St. Nicholas A. C., New York; on Saturday night he fought Soldier Kearns four rounds at Plattsburg before ten thousand United States soldiers, while on Monday night the champion boxed Soldier Bartfield ten rounds at Buffalo. And Ted has at least eight more bouts arranged for the next three weeks. How he does it is the question fans and boxers ask themselves. Is it any wonder that wherever Ted fights record crowds turn out. Every time the champion steps into the ring, the fans know that they are in for a real battle.

NOT TO RESERVE SEATS FOR SERIES

New York, Sept. 7.—Seats for the World Series baseball games this year will not be reserved by mail, but every ticket possible will be placed on public sale at the grounds, the New York National League club announced tonight. Numerous letters asking for reservations have been received by the club, it was stated.

"Absolutely no reservations will be made and nothing will be done in regard to the World's Series until the time has arrived when it will be possible to issue an announcement covering all details," the club's statement said.
