

THE PROHIBITION BILL ADOPTED BY THE HOUSE

The Publication of Liquor Advertisements in This Province to be Prohibited--Liquor Confiscated May be Sent to a Hospital--The Doherty Act Will Not be Made Applicable to This Province.

The House met at 3 o'clock and immediately went into committee with Mr. Leger (Westmorland) in the chair and took up for further consideration the bill to amend the intoxicating liquor act.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said since the bill was last in committee he had had the amendments suggested incorporated in a new bill, which he proposed to substitute for the original bill. The amendments included a provision that a magistrate might be empowered instead of ordering seized liquor to be destroyed to have it sent to a hospital; that beer shops might keep open until 11.30 instead of 10 as in the original act, and the section providing for the application of the Doherty Act to this province was struck out.

Mr. Mersereau said he understood that the bill would require people in the country who kept little shops for the sale of ice cream, soda water, hop and root beer, etc., to take out a license. If he understood aright he did not think that provision was fair.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said the section was specific enough. All persons who sold hop or root beer needed a license. With regard to analyzing seized liquors the provincial analyst lived in St. John and to compel his attendance to give evidence in one of the northern counties of the province would entail considerable expense. An amendment to the section therefore provided that his certificate of analysis should be accepted by the courts as evidence.

Mr. Burchill asked with reference to the section prohibiting the advertising of liquor in newspapers whether that section applied to newspapers published in counties where the Scott Act remains in force to which counties the Prohibition Act does not apply.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said in his opinion the prohibition was general, and therefore would apply to all counties alike.

Mr. McGrath — "J. L. Stewart of Chatham says you cannot stop him." If the attorney general's opinion was correct it would make some sections of the act which only applies to counties where the Scott Act is not in force apply to those counties also. The bill was then agreed to as amended.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale introduced a bill to facilitate the drainage of farm lands.

agreed to the bills to confirm Walter Limerick in title to certain lands in the City of Fredericton and also to authorize the Town of St. Andrews to extend their water works system and agreed to the same with certain amendments.

The House again went into committee with Mr. King in the chair and took up consideration of a bill to facilitate the collection of taxes in Fredericton. An amendment stipulating the life and fire insurance companies doing business in Fredericton, but having no office here shall be equally liable for assessment was adopted. Another section which asked authority to reduce the discount rate to two per cent. and add one per cent. per month to all taxes not paid within thirty days met with opposition on the ground that it was too drastic.

Mr. Crockett said the section was intended to apply to those rate payers who were able to pay, but delayed doing so.

Hon. Mr. Foster thought the penalty would be too severe in the case of those without the means to pay promptly.

After some further discussion the bill was referred back to the municipalities committee and progress reported.

A committee also dealt with a bill relating to sinking funds in the City of Fredericton and to enable the city council to make temporary loans, both of which were agreed to.

The committee took recess at 5 o'clock.

The committee resumed at 8.15.

Hon. Mr. Foster moved that when the House adjourns it stand adjourned till 2.30 tomorrow.

House adjourned at 8.20.

"And once more?"

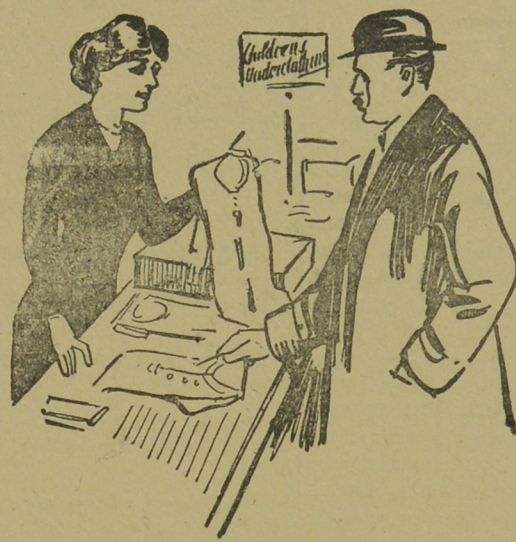

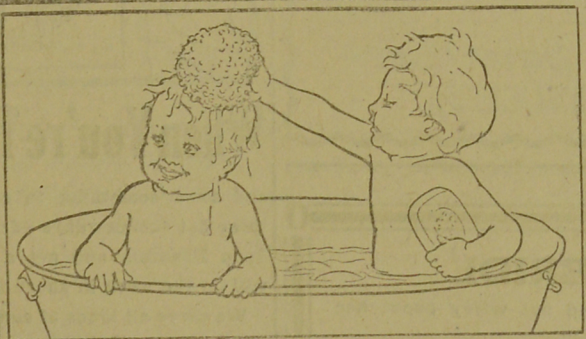

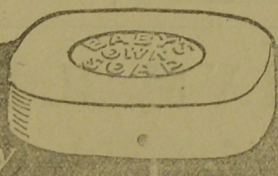
