## YOUNG AUSTRIAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT AT MINTO

Story of Two Companions is That He was Killed by a Rifle as He Picked it up in a Boat.

Word was received here today through citizens of Minto of the accidental death by shooting on Wednesday of a young Austrian living at that place. The Austrian was only seventeen years old and was employed at the coal mines at Minto.

On Wednesday he and two other Austrians went out duck shooting and fishing in Grand Lake. Two of them got out of the boat to get lunch ready on shore, and left the young fellow in the boat. He rowed out about 200 feet. Suddenly the report of a rifle was heard, and on looking around the two men saw the young man leap up in the boat and fall down.

They undressed and swam out to the boat, where they found the young fellow lying dead on the bottom. He had stooped and picked up the rifle, with muzzle toward him. The trigger struck some obstacle and the weapon was discharged. The bullet struck him in the chest and came out through his shoulder-blade, killing him instantly.

The remains were brought to Minto, where an inquest was held yesterday and the verdict of accidental death brought in.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at Minto. The young fellow is survived by his mother and two sisters, his father having died a little over a month ago.

Brig. Gen. H. H. McLean of St. John is in the city today for the departure of the 236th of which he is the honorary colonel.

## EXTENSION OF SANATORIUM DISCUSSED

Delegation Before Government Re Accommodation of Returned Soldiers at River Glade.

The Provincial Government last night received a delegation in connection with the contemplated extension of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium for the accommodation of tubercular soldiers. The delegation was representative of both the Military Hospitals Commission and the commissioners of the sanatorium.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, and a committee from the executive council represented the province. Dr. Thomas Walker of St. John, represented the Military Hospitals Commission and Capt. A. E. Logie of the Army Medical Corps also was in attendance. The sanatorium commission was represented by Dr. A. F. McAvenny of St. John, Mr. C. J. Osman of Hillsboro, Hon. C. W. Robinson and Hon. J. A. Murray.

The proposition with regard to the Jordan sanatorium is that the Province and the Dominion will bear each half the cost of the extension. The Provincial Government also has consented to the use of Old Government House as a home for convalescents who will undergo vocational training.

## Boys Pleaded Guilty.

Four young boys belonging to Maryville pleaded guilty this afternoon before Magistrate Limerick to throwing stones and doing damage to property of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd. The boys all said they were under fourteen years of age and had been working at the cotton mill for two years. This evidently implies violation of the regulation relating to the employment of children.
