## LIBERALS HELD BIG RALLY AT OPERA HOUSE LAST NIGHT

Prussian methods had been used to force that measure through the house. Can the war be won against the Prussians by Prussian methods?

Troops in England.

Dealing with the question of aid for the troops in France Mr. Brown stated that 100,000 men were walking about England. If the Liberals were returned on Monday next the officers now in England must go to France and fight or come home. Was it fair to keep privates in the trenches for \$1.10 per day and officers in England getting twenty dollars per day and doing nothing? They were "parlor soldiers." The Unionists say that they get the 100,000 men from those who frequent pool rooms and drink Scotch highballs. An army like that would be defeated easily by the Germans.

The Liberals also would pay the privates as much as was being paid the men in munition factories.

No Reform from Unionists.

No reform was to be expected from the Union government. A fifty-fifty basis was promised but the promise never was fulfilled. Only seven Liberals were in there to fifteen Conservatives. Major General Mewburn at Hamilton, Ont., had promised to reform the Militia Department but under threats had apologized for what he said.

Liberals had no intention of deserting the boys in France. Australia had not quit but she had voted against conscription and there was no Quebec in Australia.

Mr. Brown stated he was not an anti-conscriptionist. He believed in conscription which would conscript everything but flesh and blood last. (Applause.)

The Affidavits.

The speaker then came to what he termed a painful matter. Rev. J. B. Daggett at Armstrong's Corner had said that Brown said he had been offered a bribe, that he (Daggett) knew the man and if it had been offered it would have been taken. 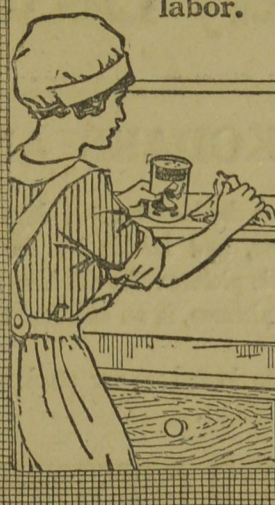

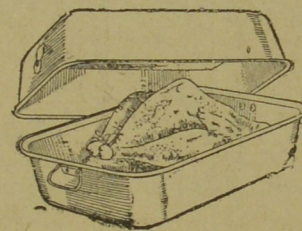
