BREAD AND MUFFINS.

Quaker Muffins.

One cup rolled oats, one cup flour, three tablespoons sugar, 4 teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt, one cup milk, one egg, one tablespoon fat.

Scald the milk, pour on rolled oats and let stand one-half hour before mixing. Mix and sift dry ingredients and add to the rolled oats and milk mixture. Add egg slightly beaten and melted fat. Beat well and bake in greased muffin pans one-half hour in a moderate oven.

Rolled Oats Bread.

One tablespoon sugar, one tablespoon shortening, one and one-half teaspoons salt, one cup liquid, one-quarter cup of water to soften, one-quarter yeast cake, one cup rolled oats, three cups white flour. Add boiling liquid to the rolled oats, salt, sugar and shortening. When lukewarm add softened yeast. Add flour to knead, using as little as possible. Moisten with water or fat to prevent crust. Cover and set aside to rise till double in bulk. Knead and put in greased pan. When light bake in moderate oven fifty to sixty minutes.

Spoon Bread.

Two cups cornmeal, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sugar, boiling water, one tablespoon fat, two eggs, one pint buttermilk, one teaspoon soda.

Scald meal and salt with boiling water enough to make a soft dough. Add

sugar, fat, yolks of eggs, buttermilk and soda. Beat well. Fold in beaten egg whites. Put in greased baking dish and cook forty-five to sixty minutes in a moderate oven. Serve from dish with spoon.

Cornmeal Rolls.

One and one-quarter cups of wheat flour, three-quarters of a cup of cornmeal, three teaspoons baking powder, two tablespoons fat, one egg, one-half cup milk, one teaspoon salt.

Sift together the dry ingredients, cut in fat. Add liquid and egg slightly beaten (may add more liquid if necessary to make soft dough). Roll one-third to one-half inch thick, handling lightly. Cut and fold as Parker House rolls and bake in a hot oven for 20 minutes.

THE SUGAR SITUATION EXPLAINED

Washington, Dec. 14.—Declaring that there is no shortage of sugar in the United States, and that the famine is local to the Atlantic seaboard, President Speckles (correct) of the Federal Sugar Refining Company, testifying today at the Senate committee's investigation placed the responsibility on the food administration.

Sugar, he declared, was now passing through New York for Canada because of higher prices. The sugar going through New York was raw and the Canadian refiners were paying a high price.

"We entered into an agreement with the food administration to pay a certain price for raw sugar. We adhered to that agreement and the product normally imported in this country went abroad because better prices could be obtained. We were forced to close our refineries for lack of supplies."

Mr. Speckles said there were still 900,000 tons of last year's sugar on hand.

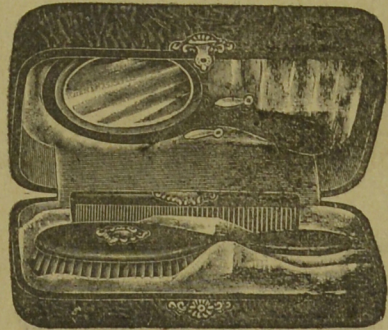
