BALFOUR ENTHUSES NEW YORK AUDIENCE

German Autocracy Characterized as an
Imminent and Over Mastering
Peril.

New York, May 12.—In his speech at a banquet here last night, Mr. A. J. Balfour moved his hearers to high enthusiasm when he said: "We have not come here as instructors of the American Republic, but it is important for me to proclaim my unalterable conviction that we have reached a crisis when the whole of civilization must rise up and voice its appeal for the preservation of human liberty."

"What has brought us together?" he asked. "What is the meaning to be found in the crowding of your streets in welcome to us?" The answer lies in the fact, he said, that America has felt the menace of German autocracy which he characterized as an "imminent and overmastering peril."

"What is the peril?" Mr. Balfour continued: "I will tell you. It is the calculating and remorseless use of every civilized weapon to carry out the ends of pure barbarism."

The Germans have co-ordinated every means of science, not to better their own people, but to dominate others. The world has been too full of unscrupulous ambitions for us not to recognize it in the present. This is not an instance of an individual genius, another Napoleon seeking to overcome the world, but something far different, far more sinister—an attempt to use every means of science to put the world under foot.

The Heinous Huns.

"Science has enormously extended the ways and means of destruction, but always it has been believed and hoped that this would be controlled by considerations of humanity. We have been taught, however, a different lesson by the ruling force of Germany; we have been taught that war has been made more heinous than ever. There is not a difference in any part of the world that German diplomacy has not tried to increase, that German money has not tried to aggravate."

"That is the danger we all have to meet. If we have seen the world wet with blood from Armenia to the Dover

MR. MURRAY'S CRITICISM WAS NOT VERY WEIGHTY

Opposition Leader Had Little to Say That
Was New--Speech From the Throne
Scarcely Came up to His Expectations--
Had Plenty of Advice to Offer the Govt.

Hon. J. A. Murray who held the office of premier for the short term of two months and is now leader of the opposition, a position which, if all reports are true, he is likely to fill for even a shorter term, delivered his first speech from the left of the Speaker in the Legislature Friday afternoon. He spoke for about one hour and his remarks were attentively listened to by both sides of the House. He referred to the changes which had occurred since last session, and paid tributes to the memory of ex-Premier Clarke and Mr. G. L. White, M. P. P. for Carleton, who lately passed away. He welcomed back some former members to the House and expressed astonishment that their party services had not been recognized by the Premier when he formed his Cabinet. He mildly criticised the speech from the throne and pretended to be astonished that the Government had not made preparation to carry out the policy which it had adopted when in opposition, respecting the administration of the crown lands and highways. He admitted that the Valley Railway was a gigantic undertaking and complained that members of the present government had not given it hearty support when in opposition. Members of the old government, he said, had nothing to fear from the promised audit of the public accounts. He stated that the old government had added in eight years \$3,274,523 to the public debt, the greater amount of which had been expended on permanent bridges, which were really an asset to the province. He was glad the Government intended to enforce Prohibition, and hoped they would do nothing to weaken the act. He praised the work of the old government in the administration of the crown lands and denied the charge that they had reduced the size of the merchantable log. He expressed surprise that there was no reference to the work of the Agricultural Department in the speech, and hoped that the new minister would supply the omission at an early date. He dwelt at some length on the old govern-

ment of returned soldiers on the land and declared his scheme was one of the best that has yet been devised. In conclusion the opposition leader expressed the hope that members on both sides of the House would not allow political feelings to interfere with their personal relations. The opposition while reserving the right to criticize and oppose unworthy legislation would not play the part of obstructionists in regard to any measures for the advancement of the province. He hoped the Premier would avoid sinister influences and assert himself in the interests of the province.

Know About Dismissal of A.
C. Fleming.

The first batch of notices of inquiry for Tuesday next were handed in by opposition members in the Legislature yesterday afternoon. Mr. Murray wants to know all about the recent purchase of seed grain made by the Agricultural Department for the farmers of the province. Mr. Young of York would like to know whether or not the dismissal of Mr. A. C. Fleming of this city from the position supervisor of public buildings, upon the order of Premier Foster, was according to Hoyle. Mr. Smith of Carleton wants information as to the number of officials who have been removed from office since the present government came into power. Mr. Potts of St. John wants to know what changes are contemplated in the Prohibitory Act. Mr. Dickson of Kings submitted an inquiry in regard to the Perry Point bridge, a contract for which was let to Mr. W. J. R. Carlen after the old government had been defeated at the polls.
