Offers to Purchase Privilege.

Mr. John W. Chase of St. Mary's has offered the City Council the sum of one hundred dollars per year for the privilege of cutting meat in the city market. Action on the matter has been deferred.

Late Miss Elizabeth McCaffrey.

The funeral of the late Miss Elizabeth McCaffrey took place today at Oromocto. Solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father Carleton at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul. Interment was made at Oromocto.

Not Next Year.

Col. G. W. Fowler and the 104th Battalion band attended the Legislative opening here last year. The Auditor General's report shows that the cost to the province was \$253,50. No such item will appear in next year's auditor's report.

Another Run-off on C. G. R.

The Canada Eastern branch of the Canadian Government Railways had another run-off last night. This was near Penniac and is the third within a fortnight. The Newcastle express was delayed in departure and the suburban train from Marysville did not make its regular trip, compelling some of the operatives of the Canadian Cottons, Limited, mill to walk to their homes, a state of affairs which they did not particularly like. It is said that the roadbed of the Canada Eastern cannot stand the heavy traffic which has been going over it lately.

REMOVAL OF GARBAGE STILL IS UNDECIDED

Delegation from Science Club Before City Council—To Hold Joint Meeting with Board of Health

The question of organizing a system for the removal of garbage in the city of Fredericton will be discussed at a joint meeting of the City Council and Board of Health to be held at some date to be decided upon. The calling of a joint meeting was determined by the City Council last night on a motion of Ald. McLellan.

The delegation from the Science Club appointed to take up the matter with the City Council was present. Its members were Bishop Richardson, F. B. Edgcombe, R. B. VanDine, R. Fitz-Randolph, Dr. B. M. Mullin, Prof. A. Cameron and R. B. Wallace. The needs of the city in the matter of garbage removal were set forth by the Bishop, Dr. Mullin and Messrs. Fitz-Randolph, Cameron and Wallace. Ald. Reid and Ald. McLellan also spoke.

Ald. McLellan stated that Moncton had paid \$3,000 per year for garbage removal, but that it was doubtful if Fredericton could spend the same. The delegation asked that the City Council provide the Board of Health with funds for such removal.

Wants to Burn House.

Through his solicitor, Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, the Earl of Ashburnham has asked permission from the City Council to destroy by fire an old dwelling on his property in King street, and immediately at the rear of his residence. Tubercular patients have occupied the dwelling, which is an unsanitary state. According to the city by-laws the mayor has the power to permit the burning of buildings. Lord Ashburnham guarantees to make good damage to other buildings, if any. The matter is in the hands of the Fire committee with power to act.

WILL FORWARD PETITIONS FOR C. T. A. REPEAL

Secretary of State at Ottawa Will Set Date of Election—Similar Action in Sunbury County.

The petition for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in the City of Fredericton which has been in the Record Office for some weeks for examination will be taken out of that office next week and forwarded to the office of the Secretary of State who, according to law has the power of setting the date for the election on the question of repealing the act in any municipality in which a petition for repeal has been presented.

Similar action will be taken with regard to the petition for the repeal of the act in York and Sunbury counties. In Other Counties.

The reports received by the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance indicate that steps toward the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Northumberland County are well advanced and that in Charlotte county the same is true.

More Appointments.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, inspector under the Prohibitory Act, left for St. John this morning. He expects to be in a position next week to announce completed organization in St. John county and the names of licensees in other sections of the province.

Death at Bear Island.

Lewis C. Jackson, a well known resident of Bear Island, died yesterday, aged sixty-four years. He is survived by a widow, two sons and a daughter. The children are John, in Massachusetts and George and Elizabeth at home. The funeral will take place Sunday at 2 p. m. Rev. Mr. Thomas will conduct the service. Interment will be made at Scotch Settlement.
