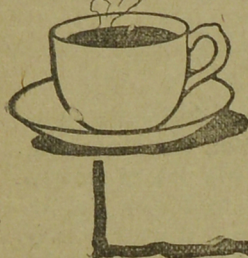

HON. MR. CARVELL IN NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax, Dec. 4. — Hon. F. B. Carvell addressed three Union meetings in Nova Scotia today. In the afternoon a crowd which exceeded the seating capacity of the theatre in Windsor heard him and H. B. Tremain, the Union candidate for Hants. Hon. Mr. Carvell was given an enthusiastic reception and the meeting was very cordial towards Mr. Tremain.

Hon. Mr. Carvell came to Halifax by special train, leaving Windsor immediately after the meeting. He spoke twice, his first address being delivered at the Casino Theatre, in the north end, and an audience of fully 1,200 hearing him. Thereafter the minister of public works came to the central part of the city and addressed a meeting in Masonic Hall that crowded it to overflowing. At the Casino Hon. George E. Faulkner, a member

the town proper to the mine lost, as it were, amidst the wilds of the unsettled and dismal Sierras, resembled a busy ant hill with thousands of scurrying ants, set in the centre of an open field. The opening of the mine had created a demand for men, and the majority of the town's idle population was employed in the task of taking the cinnabar from the mine and preparing it for shipment to the east. 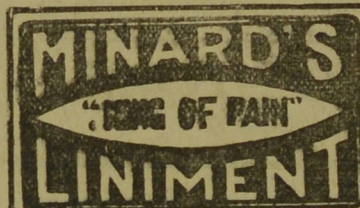
THE AD. AND THE MAN.

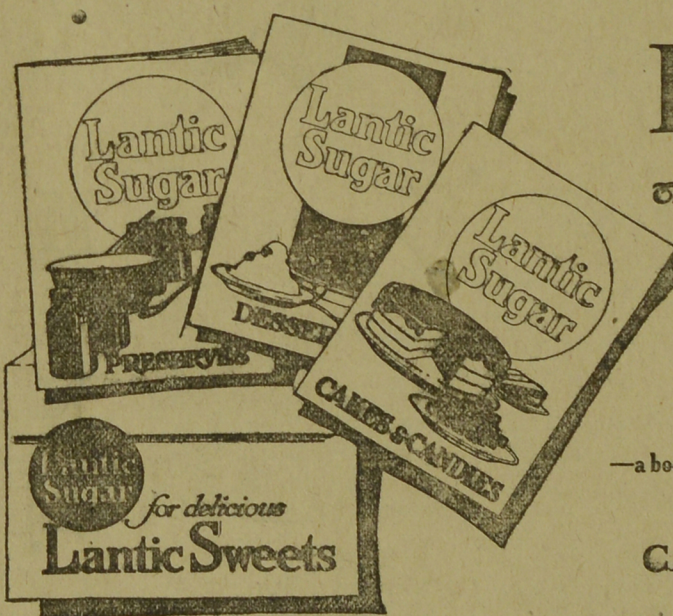

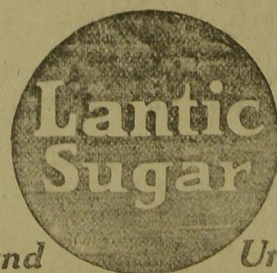
