## MANY GERMAN SUBS TAKEN AND DESTROYED

Sixty Said to Have Gone to Davy Jones Locker Within a Period of Six Weeks.

New York, March 13.—The evening Sun publishes the following despate! from Washington:

About 60 German submarines were and Feb. 15, according to reports reaching here today. This was the first authoritative word of the Entente success in coping with the undersea boats. At this rate—an average of one and one-half submarines a day, the success of the German submarines in the long run is doubtful, it is believed here. No information is available as to the number of U boats Germany has available, though unofficial reports have asserted that she had from 300

Experts here think, however, that if the Entente can continue at the rate shown between Jan. 1 and Feb. 15, and ean improve thereon, Germany will soon feel the strain upon this weapon, and that ultimately she will be forced to give up its use.

Ross Whytock, a journalist, who ac companied ex-Ambassador Gerard from Germany to Havana, writes in today's World that "The number of submarines which Germany has in service at present is not accurately known Members of the embassy who have had opportunity of investigating, state that the empire has less than 300 un derseas craft, and that under present conditions she can produce something over 100 boats each year.
