

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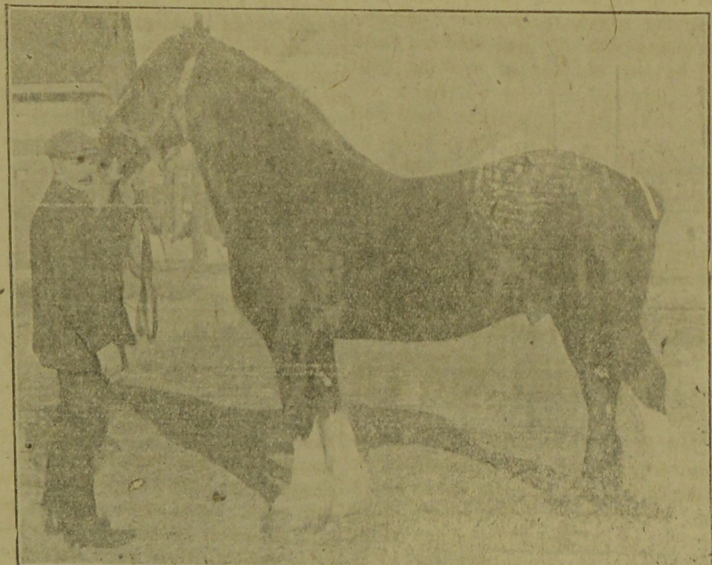
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## BUSY'S LASSIE MADE A REPEAT WEDNESDAY

## GRAND CIRCUIT RACE MEET AT KALAMAZOO

Tramp-a-Bit Captured 2.11 Pace After Being Sixth in Two Heats—Cox Put Over a Surprise.

Kalamazoo, Mich., July 31. — Two strong favorites and an outsider captured the three races on the opening day's programme at Recreation park today on the Grand Circuit.

Tramp-A-Bit was the surprise in the 2.11 pace. After finishing sixth in the first two heats, Jamieson landed him in front for the next three. Tramp-A-Bit's followers won 35 pools on \$3 tickets.

Royal Mack, driven by Tommy Murphy was easily the winner of the 2.17 trot, though Walter Cox sprang a surprise by piloting Lou Princeton ahead in the third heat with the best time of the race, 2.07 1/4.

The Savoy was a heavily played favorite for the 2.05 pace and won by a head in each heat. Tickets on the Savoy sold at \$25 against \$17 for the field. Summary:
