## Rev. W. C. Gaynor Dead.

Chatham Commercial: A telegram was received by Ald. T. Myrt Gaynor, Monday, announcing the death of his brother, Rev. W. C. Gaynor, who died while undergoing an operation at the Hotel Dieu Hospital, New Orleans. Ald. Gaynor has gone to attend the funeral.

## Fredericton Leads.

## New York Court Official.

His visit to New Brunswick is a semi-official one, as he is gathering material to be used in a case to come to trial in New York shortly in which residents of New Brunswick and former residents of the province are concerned. He will visit Perth and Grand Falls after leaving Fredericton.

## Interesting Case.

The case of the Merchants Bank vs. Kennedy & McDonald was up before Chief Justice McKeown at St. John yesterday. The bank is seeking to recover \$2,500, being the amount of a note given to Mr. Thomas Nagle prior to the last election. Mr. M. G. Teed, K.C., counsel for the bank, moved to have judgment entered for the bank. Mr. F. B. Carvell, K.C., urged that the note was invalid, having been given under compulsion. Manager Shreve of the Merchants Bank, who was called as a witness, swore that Mr. W. B. Tennant had bought the contractors' note for \$2,500, and had discounted his own note for that amount. When the Nagle note became due and was unpaid Tennant advised the bank to bring suit. The case will come up again.

## To Wed Tonight.

At eight o'clock tonight at the home of Mrs. Laura Pickard, Devon, Rev. H. H. Ferguson will perform the ceremony which will unite Mr. Frank Miles and Mrs. Laura Pickard in marriage. Stumpage and Mileage Paid in at Department of Lands and Mines by August 1st About \$200,000.

The revenue from the Crown Lands of the province appears to be in a buoyant condition as the receipts at the Department of Lands and Mines yesterday and the day preceding exceeded expectations.

Under the present arrangement no definite announcement can be made by the Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines concerning the amount taken in, but he made the statement last evening that the amount taken in for stumpage and mileage during the two days had exceeded \$200,000.

The manner in which this amount has been paid in evidently indicates that the lumbering industry of the province is not in any serious state of depression.

Hon. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines, arrived in the city last evening and is engaged today in departmental business.

Hon. P. J. Veniot also arrived last night.

## Received Discharge.

MAY OPERATE  
C. P. R. THROUGH  
MAINE FRIDAY

No Trains Moving Today — Mails from Upper Canadian Points Arriving via C. G. R.

The Canadian Pacific Railway, according to the information issued from the operating headquarters of the Atlantic Division at St. John, this morning, will have no trains operating between New Brunswick points and Montreal today. An effort is being made to have the line through the State of Maine in condition to operate trains by Friday night, and possibly the line will be clear by that time.

No trains have passed over that portion of the line since Monday as the result of the damage done by the big storm which swept over eastern Quebec and northern Maine.

The Bangor News has the following on conditions on the C. P. R. line in Maine:

"On the line of the Canadian Pacific, there being no less than twelve washouts, in one case over 200 feet of track being suspended in the air. Trains both ways were stalled Monday night and Tuesday an effort was made to return the passengers to their starting points so they might be sent over other lines."

## Mails Diverted.

Mails from points in Quebec and west, which ordinarily come by the C. P. R., have been reaching the city by C. G. R. for the past few days.

Mr. H. C. Grout, superintendent of the Atlantic Division of the C. P. R., is personally at the scene of the break in the line and all available apparatus of the C. P. R. is at work attempting to make repairs.

## On Way to Tungston Mine

Mr. L. H. Timmins, Jr., of Montreal arrived in the city last night and registered at the Queen. He is on his way to the Tungston mine at Burnt Hill and will leave for there tomorrow. Mr. Timmins recovered from a recent illness which kept him in hospital for some weeks.

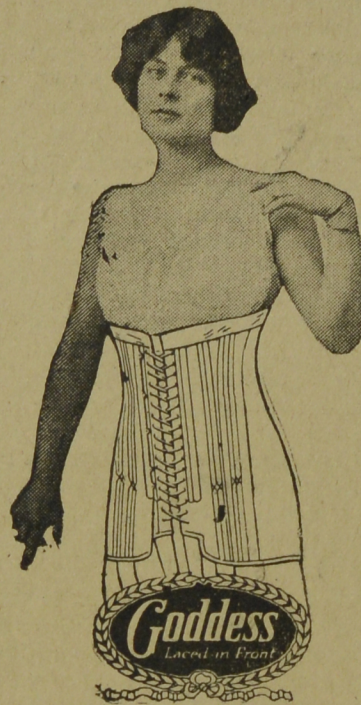

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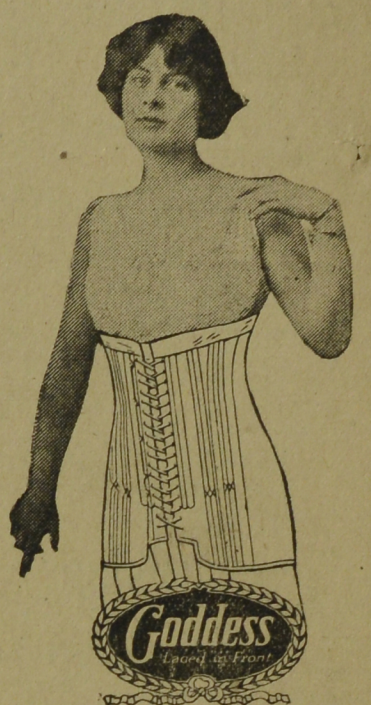
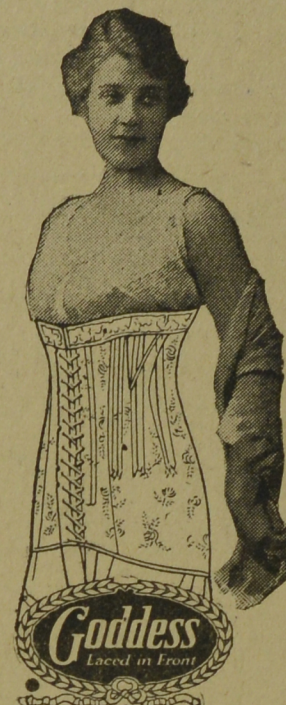
