OPPOSITION CAMPAIGN GOING WITH A SWING

Rousing Meetings Held Last Night at Various Points in the County—Strong Revulsion of Feeling Against the Government—Opposition in St. John Names a Winning Ticket.

The opposition campaign, which has been meeting with great success in York county, continued last night, when four largely attended meetings were held at Nashwaaksis, Penniac, Lower Prince William and Williamsburg. In addition to these there was an enthusiastic rally at the city committee rooms, which are a scene of constant activity.

Williamsburg.

At Williamsburg, in the parish of Stanley, Mr. John Dennison was chairman. The speaker was Mr. N. W. Brown, of Southampton, who was given an attentive hearing in a two hours' speech. The meeting was one of the best political gatherings ever held in Williamsburg. The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the chairman.

Mr. Brown severely criticized the government for its extravagance, maladministration and mismanagement. From the Auditor General's report he quoted accounts for work on bridges in Stanley parish. The Timothy Munn bridge above Hayesville was built under the old government for \$50. A year or so ago it was rebuilt at a cost of \$544.82. The Hayes Brook bridge had had its railing repaired and the under-bracing renewed at a cost of \$2,423.5. This job, competent men estimated could have been done for \$200. George Logan, his nephew, and three others came to Hayesville to repair the bridge, and with three local men were on the job for eleven days. Wages to "various persons" would give these men \$17.50 per day—pretty good pay.

The cost of the Pond Brook fill had been nearly \$3,000. The pipe which had been placed at the bottom alone cost \$268, according to the Auditor General's report.

Lower Prince William.

At Lower Prince William Mr. Albert Smith was chairman. The speakers were A. B. Kitchen, Elwood Burt, Michael Kelly and George F. Burden, ex-M. P. P. The meeting was a large one and there was every indication that at Lower Prince William as well as other points along the St. John river, the Opposition ticket will receive support on February 24th.

At Penniac.

At Penniac ex-Coun. C. N. Goodspeed was in the chair. The speakers were Coun. Alex. Brewer, P. S. Watson and Mayor Mitchell. The speakers were well received.

At the Fredericton committee rooms short addresses were made by Coun. T. W. Brewer, Ald. C. W. Burnett and H. J. McGrath. Indications point to big Opposition gains in Fredericton on election day.

Nashwaaksis.

Another meeting was held at Nashwaaksis. A large and enthusiastic audience filled the hall and nomination papers were largely signed. Mr. Geo. L. Pugh acted as chairman, and an attentive hearing was given the speakers, who were Peter J. Hughes, W. P. Lawson, T. C. Burpee and Aaron Lawson, of Edmundston.

STRONG TICKET IN ST. JOHN

St. John, Feb. 15.—One of the strongest tickets ever nominated at a political convention in St. John city was chosen by the Opposition at a rousing meeting last night. Amid ringing cheers W. H. Barnaby, who a few days ago retired from active business as a member of the reputable firm of Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Ltd., Dr. W. F. Roberts, one of the leading physicians of the city, W. E. Scully, a former member of the city council and a prominent business man of the west end, and John A. Sinclair, of the legal firm of J. Macrae, Sinclair & Macrae, were selected to contest this constituency in the Opposition interests in the coming election.

The attendance at last night's meeting was much greater than had even been expected, and the enthusiasm of the audience clearly indicated that the friends of good government are determined to wage a spirited fight in St. John against the candidates of the administration which has been responsible for so much graft and corruption and has disgraced the name of New Brunswick. The candidates, in turn, made it clear that they had accepted nomination, not because they aspired to political honors, but from a strong sense of duty. They had watched the government go from bad to worse, and they all declared that if ever the province needed a change it was now. There has been fewer more enthusiastic nominating conventions

than that held last evening.

The large hall was filled to overflowing, and the fine spirit and enthusiasm that prevailed showed clearly the general high approval of the candidates by those present. Their nomination was unanimous. Only one other name, that of William J. Mahoney, was offered, and he declined, asking all friends to transfer their loyalty and support to Mr. Scully.

All four candidates were heard in excellent addresses, and the leader of the Opposition, W. E. Foster, cleared up many misrepresentations made by members of the government party and by the government press, particularly with respect to the Prohibition Act, in connection with which it has been falsely asserted that the election of the Opposition party would delay its enforcement. Mr. Foster and Dr. Roberts showed that this statement is ridiculous on the face of it.

The candidates, all of whom stand very high in the community, condemned the present government upon its record and Hon. Mr. Murray was classed in the same category with Mr. Fleming by virtue of his endorsement of all Fleming's doings.

Queens and Charlotte.

The Opposition forces in Queens meet in convention at Gagetown tomorrow at 3 o'clock to select candidates for the Legislature.

The Opposition convention in Charlotte is being held this afternoon.

PAY THE PENALTY

The People Face to Face With Direct Taxation as Result of Tory Misrule.

Winnipeg, Feb. 15.—In presenting the annual budget to the Legislature yesterday, Hon. Edward Brown, the provincial treasurer, stated that the present revenues were "not sufficient for all present requirements," and that in the near future means must be found to augment the provincial revenues. He intimated that direct taxation might be resorted to, and that in the meantime the House would be asked for authority to issue a short term loan against outstanding revenues.
