PINDER'S DEALINGS WITH THE PUBLIC TREASURY

(Editorial from Gleaner, February 13th, 1914.)

Mr. Pinder continued to pay his respects to the Gleaner and to its managing director. A man of susceptibilities like Mr. Pinder would much prefer after all that has been said with truth of his connection with the public business, to keep silent for some time to come; but not so with Mr. Pinder. He is a bold operator who works in absolute defiance of all recognized ethics having to do with honorable dealings in public affairs. He has already been charged with a deliberate breach of trust in his connection with his unfortunate Southampton Railway operations, a breach of trust that would bring a blush of shame to almost any other man when the facts and conditions were exposed as they have been. He has been charged with taking Government property for his own use and deliberately refusing to pay for it, trading upon his position as a member of the Legislature to avoid a process for enforcement of payment of a debt that any other would be subjected to. He stands charged with passing into the Government a cheque that is to this day valueless and worthless; he is further charged with abusing his position and influence as a member for York to take the personal advantage which continued non-payment of his stumpage dues gives him at the expense of the Province. He is charged with many other practices equally as grave, which go to make up probably by far the most compromising record of any man in the public life in this Province. His only reply is misrepresentation of others in their private capacity. Listen to this as an instance: The Gleaner, against which he now cherishes bitter enmity, is said by him to have withheld stock certificates of this business in his favor amounting to \$500. What an absurdity, and to what extremes is a man driven, when he is driven to seek refuge in such absurdities. If James K. Pinder has not the stock certificates and has not in his possession paid drafts representing \$500, is not that ample evidence that he is not entitled to the certificates and has no just claim to the possession of the stock? To all those who have ever had any dealings with Mr. Pinder, it will be unnecessary to say that he did not of course pay any cash down for any stock he ever agreed to purchase. His methods would admittedly be notes or drafts. Where are the paid drafts representing the stock? The drafts he gave are lying unpaid and dishonored in the office of the Gleaner. By what order of procedure, or on what business principle would Mr. Pinder be entitled to a stock certificate with unpaid and dishonored notes as the only security? And now therefore that he has been absurd enough to introduce personal matters into a discussion which had to do only with his record as a public man, he has himself by these personal references led it to be brought out that in his private dealings he is as unreliable, as untruthful and as indecent as he has been shown to be in his capacity as a representative of this county in his dealings with the public business. Yet this is the man who is asking the electors of York to endorse a candidate who he can use to back him up in any further dealings he may even yet fancy he can have with the public treasury.

CHINA MAY HELP THE ENTENTE ALLIES

Tokio, Feb. 14.—In connection with the Japanese approval, now confirmed, of China's action in supporting the attitude of the United States towards

Germany in the submarine crisis, it is further stated that Japan has promised China all possible support, including the maintenance of order in China, where Germany's influence is considerable. China's protest to Germany, says the Japanese Times, may be taken as a prelude to China's eventual participation in the war on the side of the Entente.

APPEAL FROM OPPOSITION CANDIDATES

To the Men of York.

Gentlemen,—Having been unanimously chosen at a large convention to oppose the candidates of the present government in this county, we submit ourselves to the electorate and ask for support. The convention at which we were chosen did not represent one political party only, but was composed in large measure of men who in the past supported the present administration, but who have resolved to follow in this election the dictates of conscience rather than party and who have made up their minds that they cannot, by supporting the candidates of the government approve of wrong.

The administration in charge of the affairs of this province since 1912 has been convicted of the gravest wrong doing. The Hon. J. K. Flemming while Premier was found guilty of stamping with his approval the collecting of large sums for grossly improper purposes from the holders of Crown land licenses. The Hon. J. A. Murray, the Premier, supported in the Legislature a resolution expressing approval of this conduct of Mr. Flemming after a Royal Commission appointed by this government had found him guilty; and now the same Mr. Murray, in the manifesto which he has issued to the people of the Province, brazenly states that he will, if elected, attempt to follow in the same footsteps.

WE APPEAL TO YOU TO VOTE AGAINST SUCH GROSS DISHONEST PRACTICES. We also appeal to you upon the platform of reform adopted by the Opposition in provincial convention in January, 1916. The present government has since the adoption and publication of that platform, attempted to follow to some extent a few of its provisions. One of the planks of this platform was the adoption of province-wide prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors; another was that the taxes levied on automobiles should be used for the construction of permanent roads.

The Hon. B. F. Smith has lately appropriated to his own use part of this plank concerning the use of automobile taxes and the Legislature has since the adoption of the Opposition platform passed a Prohibition Act. That statute was therefore passed with the approval of both the Government and the Opposition. There is now nothing required to be done except the enforcing of the act, and we assure you that if elected we will not lend support to any measure tending to weaken its effect, and we will provide for its proper administration.

It will be impossible for us to see personally a very large number of the electors between now and election day. The government has decided to hold the present elections on the shortest possible notice and in the dead of winter, when the roads are blocked with snow and many of the men are away from their homes. There is only one explanation for this, namely, that the Government fears to have the light of public discussion thrown upon its nefarious transactions. Although we cannot see you all, we assure you that if elected we will devote our best energies to the best interests of the county and the province. We are
