EVERY UNIT TRIUMPHED IN THE BATTLE OF ARRAS

Believed by Many to be the Most Successful Operation Carried Out by the British During the War--Advance was Complete and Continuous and Casualties Were Light--Strong Positions Taken With the Minimum of Loss.

London, April 10.—Accumulating accounts of the battle of Arras impress the commentators here with the conviction that it probably was the most successful operation on a great scale yet carried out by the British during the war, being the only one in which every unit triumphed and obtained its immediate objective.

The critics compare it with the offensive on the Somme last July, of which one of the commentators says: "We waited on one-third of the front and attacked on the other two-thirds, obtaining a number of very important but imperfectly connected successes, which it took some days to link into a continuous advantage. The prisoners on the first day were two thousand, and after three days they numbered 4,300, while the British casualties were exceedingly.

Casualties Light.

"On the other hand, Monday's advance was complete and continuous. "The attack was nowhere baffled and

the casualties were proportionately so light that the spear point of the attacking forces was not materially blunted. Everything went in accordance with the programme and with nice precision. The perfected tactical methods practiced by the French at Verdun last October and December, and by the British on the Ancre and at Arras, a method which enabled the strongest field fortresses to be captured with less loss to the attackers than to the defenders, did not exist in its present form in July last.

Counter Attacks Expected.

"It was a new factor, slowly brought to birth, but of tremendous significance for fighting for occupied land."

It is held here that if the advance could be continued at Monday's speed it would result in almost a crushing blow to the Germans. But the military critics depreciate the expectation that it can be continued indefinitely and predict violent counter attacks with large reserves, which they say the Germans have all ready.

CLOTH DISTINGUISHING BADGES CONFINED IN USE

Only Returned Officers and Men on Duty or on Leave From Unit Can Wear Them.

The patches of colored cloth worn upon the shoulders and backs of the uniforms of officers and men returned from France, which are so mystifying to the average civilian, are not to be worn in future except by those on duty or those on leave from units in the field. A general order to that effect has been issued by the officer commanding Canadian troops in the British Isles, and the same has been promulgated in Canada. Battalion orders of the 236th Battalion yesterday contained the following:

No. 216. Dress—Cloth Distinguishing Patches. The following routine order issued by the General Officer Commanding Canadian Forces in the British Isles is also applicable to officers and men who have now evacuated from France and who are now in Canada, except those on leave or furlough direct from their units in France and not on duty.

No. 639. Dress—Cloth Distinguishing Patches. Cloth distinguishing patches authorized by the Canadian Corps to be worn overseas will not be worn by officers and other ranks evacuated from France and taken on the strength of the Canadian Overseas Military Forces in the British Isles. Officers and men not authorized under the above who are still wearing those distinguishing patches are to discontinue doing so.

Explosion Caused Over 100 Deaths

Chester, Pa., April 11.—Revised lists of the fatalities resulting from the explosions yesterday at the shrapnel loading plant of the Eddystone Ammunition Corporation at North Eddystone near here, place the number of dead at 122, the majority girls and young women. Between 125 and 150 men, women and girls were injured, at least ten being so burned and torn by the fragments of shrapnel that death was momentarily expected.

Twenty-three employees in the structure which was blown to splinters, are missing.

SUPREME COURT HEARING ST. JOHN APPEAL TODAY

Randolph & Baker Appealing From Judgment of Judge Barry--Other Cases.

Sir Ezekiel McLeod, C.J., Mr. Justice White and Mr. Justice Grimmer, of the Supreme Court of Appeal, are hearing argument of counsel today in the Berlin Machine Works, Ltd., vs. Randolph & Baker, a mill machinery case which was tried before Mr. Justice Barr without a jury a year ago in the St. John Circuit Court.

A number of knotty legal questions are involved in the appeal in which the Berlin Machine Works are now represented by M. G. Teed, K.C., and Dr. Wallace K.C.; Randolph & Baker by W. P. Ewing, K.C., and Mr. J. P. D. Lewin.

The argument will likely extend over a couple of days. This is the last case on the docket.

In the case of Rosenberg vs. Rich, a Northumberland County appeal, referred by Mr. Justice Crockett for a review of taxation, the court reserved judgment. J. J. F. Winslow for defendant supporting the review; R. B. Hanson, K.C. for plaintiff, contra.

The York County Court appeal case of Dunham et al vs. Marsten was on motion of P. J. Hughes for defendant appellant, referred back for amendment, Mr. L. E. Young for defendant consenting.
