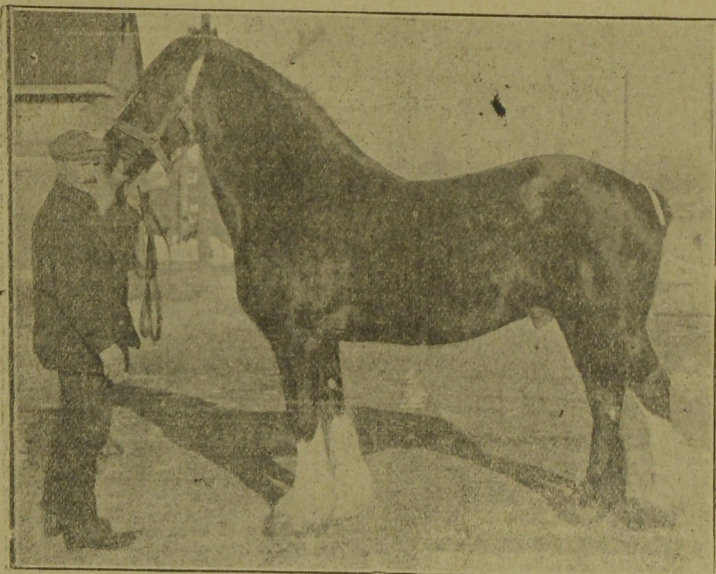

Sporting News

BATTING TIE IN NATIONAL LEAGUE GAMES

Roush of Reds and Cruise of
St. Louis, Together—Ty
Cobb Still Leading the
American.

Chicago, July 21. — Cruise, of St. Louis, has batted into a tie with Roush, of Cincinnati, for National League honors, unofficial averages released today showing them hitting .331. Roush playing in 78 games, five less than his rival. He has driven out 99 hits for 124 bases, while Cruise has stretched 98 hits for a total of 131 bases. The St. Louis outfielder made twelve doubles, six triples and three home runs as against eight doubles, six three base hits and one circuit drive for Roush.

The terrific hitting of six Cincinnati players is keeping the club safely in the first division and in possession of team batting honors. Hal Chase, veteran first base star with Cincinnati, is a point below the .300 class, and Catcher Clarke is hitting .321, but has only played in 36 games.

Hans Wagner, the Pittsburg veteran, is batting .313 for 35 games. Carey of Pittsburg, increased his lead in base stealing to 21. Hornsby is in possession of home run honors with eight. The averages include games of Wednesday.

Tris Speaker regained second place in the American League, the Cleveland star deposing Sisler, of St. Louis, with an average of .243. Sisler is five points behind. Ty Cobb fell off two points, but is showing the way with .373. Chapman of Cleveland, increased his lead in sacrifice hitting and base stealing to 44 and 29 respectively. Pipp of New York, still leads in home run hitting with six. Detroit clung to team batting honors with .254.

DETROIT MEET WITHOUT BETTING

Detroit, July 23.—For the first time in the history of Grand Circuit racing here a betless meeting was started today. Police Commissioner Cousens positively refused to allow speculation in any form and sent out uniformed policemen to see that the mutual machines were dismantled and the auctioneers properly gagged. It was understood around the old betting ring, however, that the betting of former meetings would be in operation just outside the grounds tomorrow.

The principal event, the Pont Chartrain stake for 2.14 trotters proved the surprise of the day, going into five heats.

Early Dreams won the first two heats comfortably, but was nosed out by Lu Princeton in the third. Cox landed Lu Princeton in front again in the fourth with less effort. In the fifth McDonald pushed Early Dreams out in front at the start and held the lead all the way around, though Lu Princeton failed only by inches to take the heat and race. The 2.10 pace went to Fern Hal after five heats of hard racing.

Royal Mac was easily the class of the field in the 2.18 trot and was never in danger.

JEANNETTE IN DECISIVE WIN

New York, July 20. — Joe Jeannette scored a decisive victory over Andre Anderson tonight in a ten round bout at Vanderbilt A. C., Brooklyn. Jeannette, after outpointing Anderson for eight rounds scored a knockdown in the ninth session that nearly ended the bout. He floored his opponent with a stiff left to the jaw. The bell saved Anderson from being knocked out. Again Anderson saved himself in the final round by holding.

DUNDEE AND WELLING AGAIN FIGHT A DRAW

Ten Furious Rounds Do Not
Settle Question—A Bitter
Feud Between the Two
Boxers.

New York, July 20. — The Dundee-Welling feud is not yet settled. The pair boxed furiously for ten rounds at St. Nicholas Rink tonight and when they dropped their hands at the final bell a draw was the only fair verdict.

First one and then the other held the upper hand. Johnny's terrific right-hand drives to the body offset Welling's determined aggressiveness and right-hand crosses for the jaw. It was Dundee's speed that evened matters. He out-timed Joe on many occasions and just managed to beat him to the punch. Joe was best in the close rallies, and in most of them the Italian drew away first for a respite.

Both men landed hard on the jaw but neither went down.

ED. WALSH FOR BOSTON BRAVES

Boston, July 23. — "Big Ed" Walsh, formerly of the White Sox, and at one time the leading pitcher of the country, was yesterday signed up by the Braves. Walsh is in splendid physical condition and believes he will be able to stage a comeback. He worked out with Giants this spring, but would not sign up with them except on condition that if they did not wish to retain him permanently he should be released unconditionally. The same proviso is made in his contract with the Boston club.

Stallings' pitching staff is in bad shape, and if Walsh retains even a degree of his old-time ability he will help. He has been pitching some in New Jersey this summer.

M'GRAW HEARING WAS FINISHED

New York, July 20. — After examination of four witnesses, the rehearing of the McGraw case, requested by the local chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association, ended here today and the entire testimony will now be considered by the board of directors of the National League. No decision is expected for some time. Little was developed today in the way of new or important evidence.
