ries that may be too soft for canning  
whole. Allow  $\frac{3}{4}$  lb. of sugar to 1 lb.  
of fruit. Heat the sugar and mix with  
the mashed fruit. Simmer slowly until  
of the desired thickness.

Add lemon or rhubarb juice for a  
tart flavor. Delicious jams are made  
by mixing strawberries with pineapple,  
cherries or currants, or with orange  
marmalade.

**Strawberry Marmalade.**

Clean the fruit in the usual way,  
measure and allow 1 pint of sugar to  
each quart of fruit. Rinse the pre-  
serving kettle in cold water that there  
may be some moisture on the sides  
and bottom.

Put in alternate layers of fruit and  
sugar, using fruit for the first layer.  
Heat slowly, stirring frequently.

While stirring, break up the fruit.  
Cook two hours. The finest marma-  
lade is that from which the seeds have  
been removed by means of a sieve.

**KITCHEN KINKS.**

A sheet of sandpaper will be found  
useful and a great labor saver in the  
kitchen. Soapstone sinks easily collect  
grease along the sides and back. A  
rub with a small piece of sandpaper  
keeps the sink smooth and clean. The  
bottoms of pans and kettles are easily  
cleaned this way, not using half the  
strength required with a scouring pow-  
der and nowise injuring the best of the  
ware.

To clarify frying, drop slices of raw  
potato into it.

A refreshing appetizer is made from  
grapes served with orange juice.

When baking cookies, turn your pan  
upside down and bake cookies on the  
bottom of the pan. They will bake  
beautifully on top.

Place a cocoonut in the oven a few  
minutes and it will open easily.

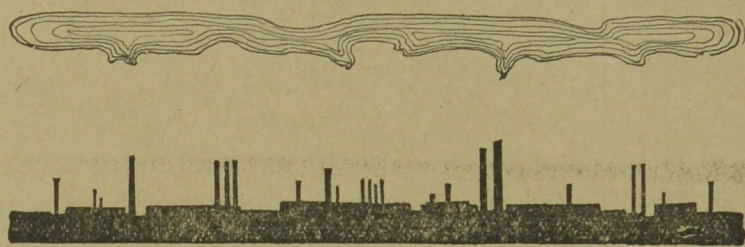

**THE PRICE OF HOMAGE**

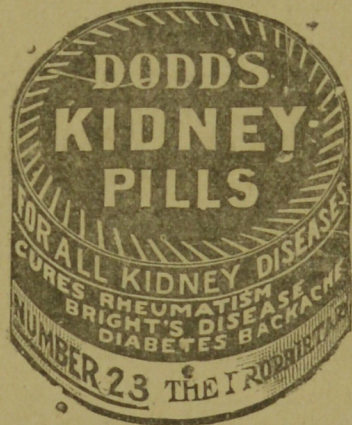
ONCE when King Edward VII. paid a visit to Sheffield,

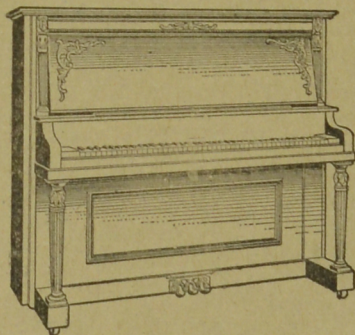
