GRAFT AND EXORBITANCE IN THE POTATO PURCHASE

The Books of the Province Kept Open to Await a Refund From the Man Who is Now Singing the Praises of Flemming—"For God's Sake Don't Tell Morrissey of This" Premier Murray is Alleged to Have Said.

Hon. B. Frank Smith in a speech at Gibson a few days ago, in addition to paying his respects to this journal of the home, extolled ex-Premier Flemming as a high-minded statesman and purist, and declared that everything was correct and proper in connection with the patriotic potato transaction. On the subject of patriotic potatoes we have testimony from Hon. John Morrissey, former Minister of Public Works, which scarcely coincides with that handed out by the righteous B. Franklin. Here is what Hon. Mr. Morrissey said on the subject in a letter to Premier Clarke:

"Again, the refusal of Mr. Chandler to investigate the purchase of patriotic potatoes, which we all know was mixed with graft and exorbitance—and no less a person than the Honorable Provincial Secretary himself told me at a meeting of the Government in the City of St. John in December 'last, that the books of the province had not been closed because, forsooth, 'the Hon. Mr. Murray, Minister of Agriculture, had told him that they were waiting for a refund of \$10,000 from B. Frank Smith and his associates because of the fuss made by the

"Opposition with respect to the patriotic potatoes.

"And do you further recall, Mr. Premier, that your colleague, Hon. Mr. Murray, said to Dr. Landry, 'For God's sake don't tell Morrissey of this?'

"If you are still of the same mind to maintain that 'high character in the public service,' I would suggest to you, Mr. Premier, that you investigate the activities of your chief organizer and government whip, Mr. H. W. Woods, who, it is claimed, and I believe correctly claimed, brought \$4,000 to the city of Fredericton at the time of the election of Mr. Guthrie, for the purpose of assisting toward that end, and, Mr. Premier, because of that election, there was a note for \$5,000 discounted in a city bank here, a note which was referred to when Colonel P. A. Guthrie, M. P., spoke in the House this session, a note which was renewed from time to time, apparently, was one of the payments made upon it, \$500, was furnished by the secretary or deputy minister of the Agricultural Department, the minister of which had full knowledge of the transaction?"

OLD TIME CONSERVATIVE SPEAKS OUT PLAINLY

Thomas Thompson Says He Wouldn't Vote for the Govt. Crowd if They Gave Him Half of Fredericton.

"I will be eighty-four years old if I live until next June. I have been a Conservative all my life, and have always worked for the party and spent money enough for it to pay for a good farm, but I want to tell you that I wouldn't vote for this Government crowd if they were to give me half of Fredericton. You can put that in the paper, as I do not care who knows it."

Thus spoke Mr. Thomas Thompson, a highly respected resident of this city, in conversation with a Mail representative last evening. Mr. Thompson is a native of the parish of Sheffield, Sunbury county, and resided there up to about twelve years ago, when he removed to this city. For fifteen years he carried on business as a bridge builder in partnership with the late Mr. Thomas P. Taylor, of Sheffield. He was always active in political affairs and is an ex-councillor of his parish. When Hon. J. D. Hazen ran his first election in Sunbury Mr. Thompson had charge of the organization in Sheffield, a traditional Liberal parish, and it was the majority they took out of that poll that swung the election for the Conservatives.

Mr. Thompson is wonderfully active and bright for one of his years. He carefully reads the daily newspapers and is remarkably well posted on what is going on. "I have been exercising the franchise," he said, for over fifty years, and on Saturday next, if my life is spared, I will go to the polls and cast my first Liberal vote.

"They can call me a turncoat if they like, but it matters little to me. I never got anything out of any party and I want nothing. I hope the Opposition will sweep the province and I must say the indications point that way. They have brought out a lot of good candidates, and deserve to win."

The Patriotic Fund.

Coun. Douglas brought up the matter of assessing for the \$5,000 deficit for the Patriotic Fund in 1916 and moved reconsideration of the previous motion concerning it. He did not want the impression to go out that he had voted contrary to the opinion he had advanced in August last. Confusion existed in the minds of the councillors and reconsideration was the best way in which to deal with the matter.

The motion was carried by a vote of 14 to 10.

The matter was reconsidered and members of the Patriotic Committee were allowed to address the Council.

Government Candidates Invade the Government Stronghold of Stanley—Other Meetings.

Stanley, Myshrahl Settlement, Newmarket and McKeen's Corner all were the scenes of successful meetings of the interests of the Opposition last night. In addition there was an enthusiastic rally at the Fredericton committee rooms.

Reports from all sections of York county are most encouraging.

Fredericton.

At the Fredericton committee rooms the best rally of the campaign took place. There was a large attendance of electors and rousing speeches were made in which the Provincial Government's record was shown up in detail. Mr. M. Atkinson took the chair and the meeting opened at 8.15. Those who spoke were Coun. Alex. Brewer, of Douglas, R. W. McLellan, H. J. McGrath, Coun. T. M. Brewer, of Dumfries, Coun. Douglas of Stanley, and Chairman Atkinson.

Stanley.

At Stanley there was held a meeting which was a surprise, as it was in a place known heretofore as a Government centre. There was a large number of people in attendance and although the speakers were late in arriving, having driven from Fredericton, the audience remained in good spirits.

The chair was taken by John McCarron. All the candidates, Elwood Burt, A. B. Kitchen, P. J. Hughes and Coun. W. P. Lawson, made excellent speeches and made good impressions. Mr. Hughes made a very effective address in which he gave instances of the extravagance and maladministration of the government.

During the meeting the Opposition nomination papers were signed generally and names were placed on it which it hardly would be believed would be placed there.

Myshrahl Settlement.

At Myshrahl Settlement the speakers were T. C. Burpee, Michael Kelly and Henry Lehr. The attendance was large and those present were enthusiastic.

Newmarket.

Geo. F. Burden, W. A. Walsh and E. C. Barry spoke at Newmarket. The attendance was not large, as it had not been advertised, the bills announcing the meeting having been burned in the fire which destroyed the post office at Upper Kingsclear.
