PATRIOTIC FUND AGAIN BEFORE THE COUNTY COUNCIL

1917 Deficit of \$5,000 to be Raised
By Assessment---Warden Neill
ill and Coun. Alex. Brewer
Presides.

The Municipal Council of York
County this morning decided to raise
the 1916 deficit in the Patriotic Fund,
amounting to \$5,000, by general assess-
ment. Owing to wrong information,
the impression was abroad in the
Council that the deficit already had
been provided for, and a delegation
from the Patriotic Committee waited
upon the Council to explain.

Owing to illness, Warden Neill could
not attend, and Coun. Alex. Brewer
presided over the Council.

The report of the Scott Act com-
mittee was presented by Coun. Sloat
and adopted.

Tax Discount Question.
Coun. Manuel, seconded by Coun.
Goodine, moved that tax notices con-
tain a printed clause calling attention
to the fact that a discount of two and
a half per cent. would be allowed for
prompt payment. Carried.

Coun. Everett, seconded by Coun.
Robt. Graham, moved to reconsider the
motion of Friday that a discount of
2½ per cent. be allowed on taxes paid
within ten days of demand.

There was a lengthy discussion, in
which the opinion was expressed that
the discount period should be thirty
days instead of ten days. The motion
was lost on the following vote:

C. P. R. OFFICIALS EXPLAIN TIE-UP OF WESTERN FREIGHT

Embargo on all Goods East and West
Of Megantic---Movement of Over-
seas Freight Has Caused
Great Congestion.

The Transportation Committee of
the Board of Trade met Mr. L. Mulkern
and Mr. James E. Brooke, of the C. P.
R., last evening in reference to the
slow delivery of freight at the present
time. The merchants explained that
goods which have been on the way
from Montreal and Toronto since De-
cember had not arrived. Other mer-
chants had cars that were a month
overdue.

Mr. Mulkern explained that the C.
P. R. was giving the preference to
goods for overseas, and this had been
one of the severest winters in his ex-
perience. He admitted that the C. P.
R. was badly tied up and said that
since the first of this week there had
been an embargo on all goods east and
west of Megantic; that the C. P. R.
were not accepting goods for shipment
to Fredericton from either Montreal or
Toronto, and it would be at least ten
days before the embargo would be
lifted.

In the meantime the C. P. R. will
do its best to clean up the goods that have
been held up in transit for weeks.

Good Week's Work.

Sixteen men were secured for the
236th Battalion during the week and
eight were rejected. The men of the
236th will be permitted to go home to
vote, and their expenses will be re-
funded by the government on the pro-
duction of a certificate from the poll
clerk showing that they have voted.

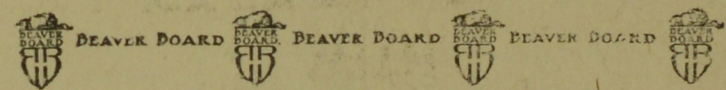

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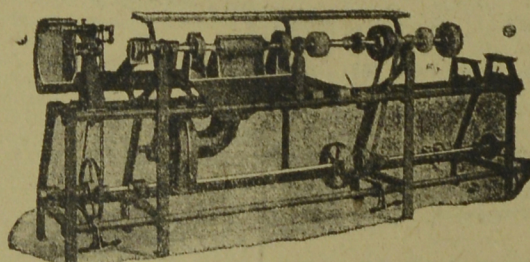
