matching materials.**TREAT COLD TOMATOES KINDLY.**It seems a shame to take cold toma-  
toes out of the ice box and pour scald-  
ing water over them, or even to heat  
them over a gas flame in order to peel  
them. It seems equally a shame to  
slice tomatoes for salads without peel-  
ing them as some people think neces-  
sary. If this is done the skin should  
not only be washed, but rubbed clean,  
and then, who wants to eat it?To peel a tomato rub it down firmly  
from the blossom to the stem end and  
and all the way round with the back of  
a good knife for peeling such fruits.  
This loosens the skin and leaves the  
flesh in a better condition than scald-  
ing does. It takes but a little practice  
to get the knack.In preparing a tomato do not re-  
move the stem until after the tomato  
is sliced. Some people take it out be-  
fore removing the skin. The tomato  
is almost sure then to lose its shape.  
If it is left in, the tomato may be sliced  
in slices as thin as a wafer. It is ne-  
cessary to use a sawing motion, as in  
bread cutting, and it is no more suit-  
able to bear down or press hard on  
the tomato in slicing it than it is to


