## WESTERN MEMBER PUTS TI UP TO SIR ROBERT BORDEN

**Mr. J. G. Turiff Charges the Government With Grave Maladministration in Connection With the War--Premier Borden Quoted as Saying There Would be no More Recruiting if He Could Help It.**

Ottawa, Jan. 26.—Three charges, specific and damning, were hurled at the silent government benches tonight by J. G. Turiff, in the course of a telling and convincing arraignment of maladministration of the war, or worse than maladministration.

1. He charged that recruiting had been deliberately cut down in Quebec with a view to working up racial prejudice against Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the English-speaking provinces.

2. He charged that when the representatives of the Ontario Recruiting League had waited upon Premier Borden in private conference last spring, Sir Robert Borden had "intimated that if he had his way there would be no more recruiting in Canada, and the attention of the Canadian people would be turned to the development of their industries."

3. He charged that the government was directly responsible for the loss of thousands of Canadian lives through keeping in the hands of the troops at the front an unserviceable rifle for months after it was known that the rifle was unserviceable, and for months after Sir Charles Ross had offered to make other rifles.

All his charges he declared he would make good to the hilt if a committee of investigation were granted.

Mr. Turiff spoke with the deadly earnestness of a man who had recently lost his only son, killed in action at the front.

There was no reply from the government benches. For the last few days the arraignment from the Liberal side of the house has been allowed to go unanswered.

"I make this charge against the government," declared Mr. Turiff, "and I make this charge particularly against

the Prime Minister, who is the responsible man, that this alliance with the Nationalists has been continued in force and that three Nationalists have been kept in this government deliberately and for the one and only reason of preventing recruiting in Quebec, for the sole and only purpose of being able to carry on the next election as a racial fight bringing into line as far as they could all the English speaking provinces in Canada against Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the French in the province of Quebec."

### Against Recruiting?

A little later on he said: "We have heard a good deal about what a young Irish-Frenchman, Mr. Cannon, had been saying, but we have not heard anything from the honorable gentlemen on the other side of the house about the intimation that had been made by Sir Robert Borden. We have not heard about the intimation given by the Prime Minister last spring to the representatives of the Ontario recruiting committee of Toronto that if he had his way there would be no more recruiting in Canada, and that the attention of the Canadian people should be turned to the development of their industries. This was followed by a direct falling off in recruiting from one end of Canada to the other."

Hon. Mr. Meighen—"Will the honorable gentleman give his authority for ascribing these words to the Prime Minister?"

Mr. Turiff—"If my honorable friend, who is a Minister of the Crown, will appoint a committee, I will give my authority and bring him forward, and I will make good."

Mr. A. B. Copp, of Westmorland, followed Mr. Turiff, and arraigned the government in a vigorous speech.

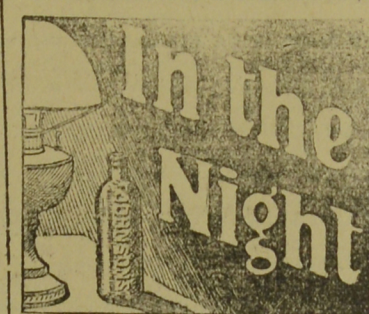

class room accommodation is restricted, not more than twenty-four students can be enrolled in a class this term.

In undertaking this work committees are engaged in maturing plans to afford means to young women as well as young men, and older ones, too, to become wage earners by fitting themselves to acquire dollars with greater ease and system than is at present possible.

Housekeepers will have more opportunities to enrich and make more palatable the home cuisine, after the war, and maids may receive such training as will enable them to satisfactorily perform any phase of housework.

### Deposit Necessary.

The trustees obtained much information from Prof. Sexton, director of technical education in Nova Scotia, during his recent visit to Fredericton, and the people will receive the benefit of this.

The size of the classes is limited and it is thought possible that some person might enroll at the start and later drop out for some trifling reason, and thus prevent another from the benefit of the class.

Upon enrolment the applicant will be required to deposit the sum of \$2, which sum will be returned at the conclusion of the course where regular attendance is recorded.

### Large Enrolment.

There have been five meetings of the trustees in the last twenty-nine days, and another is booked for next week.

Fifteen hundred pupils are at present enrolled in the city schools, and Secretary Sampson reports that applicants for permits are of daily occurrence.

### Applicant for County Office.

Mr. Gregory T. Feeney, of this city, attorney at law, is reported to be an applicant for the position of County Secretary-treasurer made vacant by the death of the late F. St. John Bliss.
