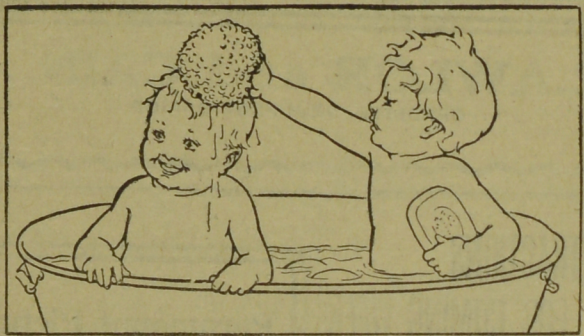

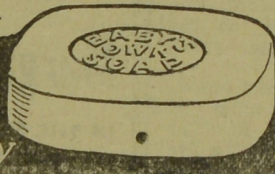

## CANADIAN COLONELS SOMEWHAT SLIGHTED

Cool Reception in England for Canadians Who Have Cheaply Acquired a Military Title.

Patriotic Canadians went to work to raise regiments for service in the European war. Prominent citizens of various communities cheaply acquired the title of colonel. They bore their honors bravely and possibly strutted a little. They talked some in public, and then, with fine swords, sailed overseas to present themselves and their recruits for service in the trenches.

In England the recruits were gladly and gratefully accepted. But as to the colonels, that was a different matter. A colonel is a man of great importance in real warfare. He should, according to the new British notions, be a man of proved military ability, and these colonels from Canada knew little or nothing about the actual business.

So England accepted the recruits and rejected the recruiters. The colonels were subjected to examinations, and on the basis of their ability they were given an opportunity to become either captains or lieutenants in the British army. But they were encouraged to believe that through efficient service in the field they might soon become colonels by promotion for approved valor and ability.

This was irksome to the colonels, or to some of them. A few are coming home rather than accept the minor commissions.

And Canada, as is right, is not going to welcome these returners. They have placed personal pride above patriotic service. Their own commissions have appeared to them more important than the welfare of the British Empire.

A man whose foremost aim is personal advancement is neither a good soldier nor a simon-pure patriot. Fortunately for Canada, there are not many of these furious egotists. Canadian officers as well as private soldiers have been a great credit to the Dominion since the beginning of the war. The few exceptions will not lessen the credit which has been nobly won.

## LISTEN TO THIS! SAYS CORNS LIFT RIGHT OUT NOW

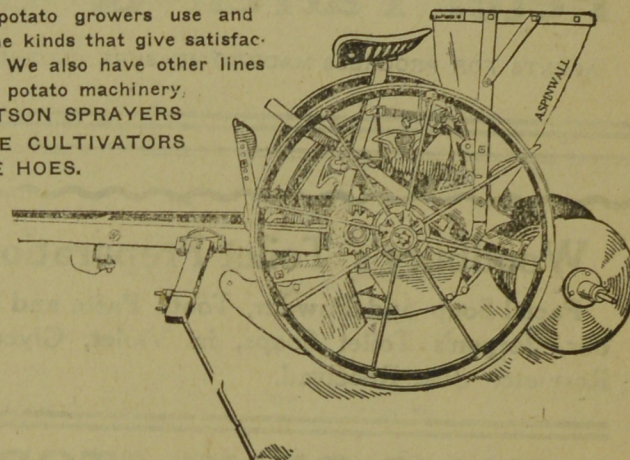

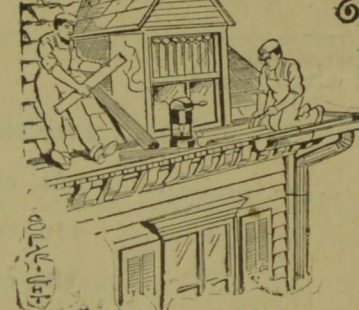
