LIEUT. J. A. WINSLOW DIED IN FRANCE THIS MORNING

Fredericton Officer Succumbed to Pneumonia While on Service With C. E. F.—Left Canada With First Division, C. E. F.

A cablegram from Major Rainsford H. Winslow, received by his brother, Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, this morning, conveyed the sad intelligence that their brother, Lieut. Jasper A. Winslow, passed away this morning. The end came peacefully, the deceased succumbing to an attack of pneumonia which was brought on by exposure during the winter campaign in France. Lieut. Winslow left Fredericton in August, 1914, with the first infantry detachment raised here during the war. He went to England with the original 12th Battalion. After serving with it in England for some time, he took an artillery course and was appointed to one of the Divisional Ammunition Columns of the C. E. F. in France.

He is the third Fredericton officer to give up his life in the present war. The deceased officer was forty-two years old. He was a son of the late E. Byron Winslow, of Fredericton. Five brothers survive, Wentworth Winslow, of New York; J. J. Frazer Winslow, of Fredericton; Edward Winslow, of Vancouver; Robert N. Winslow, in the West, and Major Rainsford H. Winslow, in France with the C. E. F. Two sisters also survive, Mrs. George D. Ireland, of Vancouver, and Mrs. E. L. duDomaine, now in England.

The deceased for a number of years was a clerk in the local branch of the Bank of British North America. Late he was connected with a brokerage firm in Havana, Cuba.

VETERAN OF ORANGE ORDER PASSED AWAY HERE LAST NIGHT

Howard Segee Dies From Old Age—For Some Years Door-keeper at House of Assembly—Orange Funeral Monday.

Howard Segee, Fredericton's oldest native resident, and a veteran of the Orange order, died last night at his home in this city in his ninety-first year. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon at 3.30, Rev. Thos. Marshall conducting the service. Interment will be made at Rural Cemetery. The funeral will be under Orange auspices.

The deceased is survived by three sons and two daughters, Charles, Fredericton, Milton and Isaac, of Boston, Mrs. Leonard Flett, and Mrs. Charles Flett, of Fredericton. Fourteen grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren also survive.

The deceased was for seventy years a member of the Orange order, and had reached the highest division, the Royal Black Knights of Ireland. He also was a member of Graham Lodge, No. 20, the Royal Scarlet Chapter, and the Prentice Boys. In his younger days he was present at "the Battle of York Point," a riot which attended the march of the Orange lodges of New Brunswick in St. John on July 12th, 1849, and which was accompanied by bloodshed and loss of life.

The late Mr. Segee was an engineer on a river steamer in the early days of steam navigation on the river St. John. He also rode as a jockey in races on Fredericton's first race-track. In recent years, in spite of advanced age, he was a doorkeeper at the House of Assembly.
