## ONTARIO TORY MEMBER WANTS SEVIGNY BEATEN

Says That It is the Best Thing That Could Happen to the Conservative Party--- Would Give the Tories a Free Hand to Raise the Race Cry in the English Speaking Provinces---Nationalist Influence Cause of poor Showing in Quebec.

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—It was left to W. A. Boys, M. P. for South Simcoe, speaking from the government side of the House, in continuing the debate on the address in parliament this afternoon to stir up first the smoldering fires of racial prejudice which promise to play a large part in the Conservative campaign material for the next election.

Curiously enough, Mr. Boys made the basis of his reference Sir Wilfrid Laurier's stirring appeal, as published in the Toronto Globe last week: "Let us here and now sink passion, prejudices, vain and idle recriminations." For this sentiment and the accompanying appeal for continued enlistment and for united effort, Mr. Boys gave Sir Wilfrid credit for full sincerity. But at the same time he insinuated that Sir Wilfrid was allowing his apostle in Quebec, Lucien Cannon, to preach disloyal sentiments and to appeal to race prejudice. Mr. Boys emphasized what the Orangemen had done in the way of enlistment and quoted with gusto the reported utterance of Mr. Cannon at St. Prosper: "Are we to ruin our country from the point of view of men and wealth and everything else for England? I say no."

Before he could get any further, Mr. Gouveau, Temiscouata, whose son is serving on the British naval sentinels on the North Sea, interjected: "He never said it. You have no proof of it. He has denied it."

Mr. Boys countered with the statement that at any rate the Montreal newspapers had so reported Mr. Cannon. Then he added: "From the political standpoint, so far as I can see, the best thing that could ever happen to the Conservative party under the circumstances would be the election of Cannon."

## Quebec Record Contrasted.

Continuing along the line of contrasting Quebec's attitude toward the war with the attitude of Ontario, Mr. Boys declared that while recruiting for the whole province of Quebec totalled only a little over 41,000, Toronto alone had recruited over 85,000.

If Quebec would rise to the occasion and furnish her fair quota of recruits, he declared, then Canada's full total of 500,000 men would be speedily recruited. Instead of the members of parliament from Quebec wasting time in the House of Commons, they should, headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, go out and recruit through their own province.

Where are Cabinet Ministers? E. W. Nesbitt, North Oxford, who followed Mr. Boys, promptly countered with the statement that there were a number of French-Canadian ministers

and supporters of the government from Quebec who ought to set the example first. As to the correctness or incorrectness of Mr. Cannon's speech, said Mr. Nesbitt, that must be left to those who were on the spot. Naturally, partisan organs of the government would give what they thought would best serve their immediate ends. At any rate, Mr. Cannon had issued his official denial.

D. D. Mackenzie, South Cape Breton, charged Nationalist influence in the cabinet with responsibility for poor war time administration. This influence had exerted itself against General Sam Hughes in the cabinet and Hon. Dr. Sproule in the Speakership.

Hon. Charles Maclellan, the last speaker of the day, gave a well-reasoned and convincing exposition of the Quebec situation. Any lukewarmness in recruiting, he said, was due to the pernicious Nationalist doctrine preached for years past with the connivance of the Tory leaders and despite the best efforts of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal leaders to counteract it.

As a result of the expression of opinion given at today's Conservative caucus, it is likely that the government will accept Sir Wilfrid Laurier's suggestion and adjourn parliament next month in order to allow the Prime Minister to attend the London conference. An adjournment from Feb. 15 to April 10 was tentatively agreed upon. The question of the extension of parliament will be left over until Sir Robert Borden's return.

Already his portfolio has been promised to prominent Irish Catholic on the North Shore, who now has the offer under consideration. "Nothing doing" was all a member of the moribund outfit would say today when asked for information.

## Mother Killed Child And Was Acquitted

Paris, Jan. 25.—It is no crime for a mother to kill a child born as the result of her violation by a German soldier, a Paris jury decided today, and the verdict of acquittal was received with cheers by the crowd in court.

The case was that of Josephine Barthelemy, 20 years of age, and a domestic servant. The child was born on August 15 last, and the mother killed it immediately.

When the case came to trial it was only after the greatest difficulty that the girl could be prevailed upon to give the reason for her deed.

"I killed the child because its father was a German," she finally said in a whisper.
