SHARPLY CRITICIZES THE UNITED STATES

Head of the Princeton University Says
She Has Not Done Her
Duty.

New York, Feb. 26.—John Grier
Hibben, president of Princeton Uni-
versity, speaking in church here to-
night, criticized the United States for
what he termed its lack of interna-
tional conscience "in failing to join
the Entente allies against Germany,
and declared America's entrance into
the war was a "solemn obligation."

"We dismissed our German ambas-
sador and we stand at the present time
in readiness to war with Germany,
yet we as a nation are not prepared
to go to war with any country, Euro-
pean or Asiatic, except perhaps one,
China."

"Why are we so brave now? Let
us be frank. There is only one rea-
son, and that is because we know the
great British fleet stands between us
and Germany at the present time."

"I am free to confess that America
as a nation has not risen to the appre-
ciation of the obligation resting upon
it. What have we done for Belgium?
We have grown rich out of the misery
of that country. We have not the first
vestige of international conscience. I
do not wish to see Germany crushed,
but I do wish that over this ambition
of a world empire which Germany has
had for the past forty years should be
written one word, and that word is
"failure."

DEFEAT OF GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN LONG OVERDUE

Traitors to the People's Interests Corrupt
And Viciously Partizan---Had the Sup-
port of a Degraded Press---Public Dis-
trust Increased by Shocking Proof of
Wrong Doing.

To win against such odds, backed by
the prestige of two governments, is a
really wonderful performance, and
upon it Mr. W. E. Foster and his party
will be heartily felicitated from one
end of Canada to the other. Though
Mr. Foster himself was beaten by a
few votes in St. John county, he must
share largely in the credit for the
party victory, and no time should be
lost in arranging to provide a seat
for him, a matter which should be
easy, considering the situation created
by the vote of Saturday. Mr. Foster
stepped into the breach at a time when
the odds were great, and gave the
party clean, courageous and progres-
sive leadership. It must be felt that
he has before him a long career of po-
litical usefulness.

THE DEFEAT OF THE MURRAY-
BAXTER GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN
A LONG TIME DUE, FOR THIS GOV-
ERNMENT WAS NOT NEW AND
NOT CLEAN. With some cabinet
changes the men in the cabinet and in
the Legislature were the same men
who shared Mr. Flemming's political
success up to the time of his expos-
ure and whitewashed him after it.

TRANSACTIONS IN THEIR OWN
WARDS AND PARISHES. So, when
the test of battle came, the govern-
ment was already condemned in the
hearts of the people, and only its reck-
less and shameless use of corrupt
methods enabled it to win in a min-
ority of the constituencies. It was
bad to the core, and the fact that it
fell before the blows of an opposition
which worked without money enough
even for legitimate organization ex-
penses goes far to reveal the real state
of the case to any portion of the pub-
lic that was really deceived as to the
character of the government. Were
the battle to be fought over again to-
morrow, the Murray-Baxter adminis-
tration would not elect a corporal's
guard.

GERMAN IRISH

LEAGUE FORMED

London, Feb. 26.—A despatch to
Reuter's Telegram Co. from Amster-
dam quotes a Berlin message as say-
ing:

"The German Irish League, formed
recently, has held its first meeting.
General Von Ludendorff, first quar-
ter-master general, and Dr. Alfred Zim-
merman, secretary of foreign affairs,
sent congratulatory messages. The
Hague aims at the promotion of rela-
tions between Germany and Ireland,
and it will support all enterprises in
this direction."

The Berlin despatch adds, says the
correspondent, that the formation of
this league at this moment will be
valuable encouragement for an Am-
erican Irishman's league and it will
also prove to Irishmen in Ireland that
they are not forgotten in Germany in
these serious times.
