ROOSEVELT WAS WARMLY GREETED AT TORONTO

Ex-President of the United States Speaks On Behalf of Canada's Victory Loan--A Stirring Message to Canadians--A Demonstration Unsurpassed in the History of Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 26. — Tremendous enthusiasm greeted Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and his party upon their arrival here at 12.45 p. m. to assist in the great Victory Loan meeting this evening. The premier of Canada, Sir Robert L. Borden, who was leaving for a political meeting at Uxbridge, had his train held specially in order to shake hands with "Teddy." Among the others who welcomed him were Sir Wm. Hendrie, Lieut. Governor of Ontario, Sir Wm. Hearst, provincial premier, Mayor Church, Major General Logie, commanding the military district, and other staff officers.

When the ex-president stepped off his car he was greeted with three rousing cheers and when he reached the street, which was jammed with people, the ovation was immense, as the headquarters band played "The Star Spangled Banner", and the guard of honor from Canadian officers' training corps presented arms.

Although 12,000 people heard Theodore Roosevelt speak in support of Canada's Victory Loan at the ornate this evening, fully 20,000 others

were unable to gain admission.

The ovation that was given the colonel when he stepped onto the platform has never been surpassed in the history of Toronto. People shouted themselves hoarse and waved Union Jacks and Stars and Stripes. The great audience rose and sang God Saves the King and the Star Spangled Banner, while Teddy stood rigidly at attention.

Then the crowd went wild with enthusiasm. It was a fitting climax to the reception that was given him on his arrival at noon today when he was received by a military guard of honor and driven through crowded streets of cheering people accompanied by an escort from the Royal Flying Corps on motor cycles.

"Welcome Teddy," read the big sign which hung opposite the platform, flanked by the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack, and it was a welcome long to be remembered.

"Colonel Theodore Roosevelt," declared the chairman, Sir Thomas White, introducing him, "has been of incalculable assistance in mobilizing the moral forces of the world against Germany and its iniquities. We welcome him as a statesman, as a gallant soldier, as a humanitarian and, above all as a man, for he's every inch a man."

When the ex-president rose to speak the audience sprang up, waving flags and cheering, while the band broke into Yankee Doodle.

No Mincing of Words.

The colonel hit right from the shoulder. "If you can't go across, come across. You've got to hold your sons and brothers at the front."

A Victory Bond he described as the safest possible investment. "Any other security can conceivably go bad, but I imagine that Canada is going to last for a few thousand years." He advocated universal military training, in time of peace, flayed the professional pacifist and suggested that Canada and the United States might in future settle any difficulties that arose between them by an international court composed of three Canadian and three United States supreme court judges, with a seventh selected by them.

"Canada," said Sir Thomas White in his introductory remarks, "was in the war from the first and Canada will be in at the finish. Our men must have food, clothing, equipment, munitions. Behind the gun, the man; behind the man, the dollar. Victory can only be achieved by the mobilization of all our resources. Shall we reach the top of the Victory Loan as the Canadian boys reached the top of Vimy Ridge?"

"Now, thank heaven, I can come with my head up," exclaimed Colonel Roosevelt, speaking of his not visiting Canada while the United States remained neutral.

"The greatest example of neutrality throughout the ages was Pontius Pilate, and his name is not mentioned with particular reverence."

His magnetism and his sallies of wit caught the crowd.

"Don't hit a man soft," he urged. "He won't appreciate it. If you hit him soft he'll hurt you and he won't feel sentimental about it; he's not built that way. Don't hit a man at all if you're not forced to, but if you have to hit him, put him to sleep. Do your fighting on the other fellow's territory if you can. We send our sons and brothers to fight on the other side with the Allies so that they will not have to fight without Allies at home. Victory and liberty are interchangeable terms in this fight."

"I am not here to advise you. I am here to congratulate you," he said. "I am here to speak simply of the task that is yours and ours."

"Friends of Germany talked of no indemnities or annexations. 'No indemnities,'" exclaimed the colonel. "Why, Germany could not pay an indemnity large enough to make ample atonement for the wrongs of Germany."

Turning for a moment to the United States he stated that the German foe had not been as dangerous an enemy of that country as the American pacifists. A pacifist multi-millionaire had once asked him: "Don't you prefer arbitration to battleships?"

"Yes," was his answer. "I do; but suppose the other fellow don't?"

The latter portion of his speech was a magnificent tribute to Canada and the British Empire.

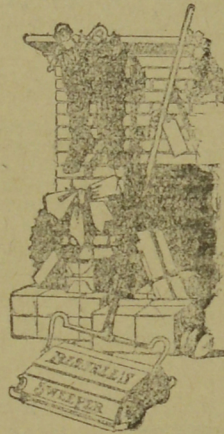

Toronto, Nov. 27. — Victory Loan subscriptions totalling \$191,019,350 were announced as reported up to 11 a. m. today from all the various provinces. The special subscriptions today include one for \$1,500,000 from the Manufacturers' Life and one for \$500,000 from the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation.

London, Nov. 26. — Sir Leander Starr Jameson, died today in London. Sir Leander Jameson was the leader of the Jameson raid on the Transvaal in 1895, shortly before the Boer war. He fought the battle of Krugersdorp and surrendered to the Boers. He and his officers were taken to Pretoria and sentenced to be shot, but subsequently were turned over to the British. He went to England and was tried for leading the illegal raid, being sentenced to fifteen months in prison.
